### RATES MAY ADVANCE

#### Fire Insurance Companies Want to Make Profits Sure.

#### WESTERN MANAGERS IN SESSION

#### CUTS OUT WHEAT'S ADVANTAGE

#### And Removes Discrimination Against the Products of Minneapolis' Great Mills.

Presidents and managers of fire insurance companies are discussing plans for an advance in insurance rates. Whether there is to be a flat increase in rates in western states has not been decided. It is said that the executives of the companies are reluctant to take any radical action. They simply desire some plan that will make insurance profits better and more reliable.

Detailed reports for 1919 in fire insurance are now being compiled. The general statement embracing the United States and Canada shows about \$1,000,000 greater loss than during the previous year, which was very unsatisfactory. It is already predicted that more companies will withdraw from business this year. About twenty-five domestic and foreign companies retired from the fire insurance business in the past fourteen months.

An Unprofitable Year.

The western situation is to be discussed by a meeting of western fire insurance managers in Chicago to-day. So far none of the western states has submitted figures on last year's losses and receipts for the consideration of the public. As a general thing the insurance men assert that the year has been a profitable one for the companies made money in Minnesota, but it is said that more did not. Some of the Chicago insurance experts have figured that Minnesota's loss ratio for 1919 is 10 per cent lower than that of 1918. Minneapolis made a first-class showing last year. Its loss ratio is believed to be low in comparison with other western cities, and especially with St. Paul. The city has made a bad start for 1920. Insurance men say that it has already scored a loss ratio of 10 per cent for the year's business of \$3.1 per cent.

Rates on many risks were gradually increased last year. This was done by making a new classification of risks and rating on an entirely new schedule. The increase fell largely on manufacturing plants, wholesale houses, department stores and like institutions. On some of the smaller risks rates were lowered, but the general tendency was toward an increase. It was thought that this plan would solve the problem. The new classification was based upon the experience of many companies lasting through many years and was generally applied through the west. It is now said that this scheme of getting more money out of the insurance business is working too slowly to suit the promoters and some faster plan is wanted.

Lower Local Rates.

The Commercial Club insurance committee intends to renew its activity on the subject of fire insurance rates. It will submit the ground last summer that Minneapolis was entitled to lower rates on account of its low ratio of loss. Comparisons were made with other cities which receives about the same rates, but which has a much higher loss ratio. While not taking direct issue with the committee at the time, insurance men are showing an interest in the matter. The insurance men insist that no drastic measures are warranted. They say that the companies ask is a reasonable profit on the business.

#### Agreement of Trans-Atlantic Lines to Advance Rates.

#### Lines Will Connect

#### Milwaukee and Northern Pacific to Join Steel at Linton, N. D.

#### LET'S C., M. & ST. P. INTO BISMARCK

#### The Soo Road's Activity in the District Cause of Combination.

The plans of the Milwaukee and Northern Pacific roads for connection in southern North Dakota include a junction of the two lines at Linton, one of the new Milwaukee stations in Emmons county. It is asserted that the Milwaukee will run its trains into Bismarck over the Northern Pacific from Linton.

The Northern Pacific will probably build its new extension from McKenzie, a station east of Bismarck, south and southwest to the junction with the Milwaukee at Linton, N. D. The Milwaukee line will be extended to the junction with the Southern boundary of the state in Emmons county, and from there east and northeast to connect with the Northern Pacific's present line at Bismarck. This is also the terminus of the Milwaukee's line north from Aberdeen.

By the arrangement at Linton it is said that the completion of the Milwaukee to Bismarck or any other point in that part of North Dakota will be delayed several years. The Milwaukee seeks simply to give its share of the traffic from the Missouri slope and to get a share of the traffic from the Northern Pacific, in the judgment of its officials, will suffice for several years to come.

Soo's Activity the Cause.

It is conceded that this activity is the result of the Soo road's extension toward the Missouri river. The Soo is building the line that is to build more lines this year. It is considered a "clinch" in railroads for the Soo to build the line to Bismarck before the end of 1920, complete its Missouri river extension to the river bank in Emmons county, N. D., and extend to the junction with the Northern Pacific at Linton. The Soo is building the line from Linton to the Missouri river, and his lower notes might well be called subterranean.
