OTHER CUBAN SIDE
Opponents of Tariff Concessions Given a Hearing.
PEOPLE NOT IDLE OR SUFFERING
Important Points Brought Out by Mr. Tawney in the Examination of a Witness.

Washington, Feb. 4.—In view of the fact that the ways and means committee is going to take a vote on a grant of a sugar and tobacco concessions in Cuba, it is timely to inquire something concerning the reasons which will impel that stand. A good deal has been said about this country's moral obligation to Cuba. This country has already expended in round numbers \$33,000,000 for Cuba, this being the cost of the Spanish war, and the sum collected under the war revenue tax from American citizens for carrying it on. Members of the ways and means committee who oppose the proposed concessions say that it is now about time for the country to think about its "moral obligation" to its neighbor. The decision of the committee to repeal the remainder of the war revenue tax was based on the understanding that there will be no recommendation of the ways and means committee for tariff concessions. This closes the question, for it can be raised only through the ways and means committee.

The hearing held by the committee have brought out a great many facts which are said to prove the unwisdom of granting concessions. To begin with, the testimony has shown the danger that over-production in Cuba, under favorable tariff conditions, would drive out of existence the cane and beet sugar industry of the United States. The sugar of the National Sugar Refining company, who testified in favor of the concessions, frankly admitted that sugar from Cuba, or anything approximating it, would entirely destroy the American sugar industry. There are 25,000,000 acres of land on the island available for the production of which 300,000 are under cultivation. Under the impetus of tariff concessions this acreage would rapidly be increased, and eventually the price of sugar would be so low that it would be disastrous for the sugar business at home.

Cubans Not Idle.
In the next place, the committee thinks that there is absolutely no truth in the statement that the people of Cuba are suffering and are without employment. The testimony shows that there is not an idle man on the island outside of Havana, and that wages are being paid for 250,000 monthly American money. There is no industrial distress, no suffering among the people.

Should the concessions be made, and the sugar plantations as a consequence grow in size, it is said that the additional labor required to work the plantations would have to be drawn from Europe or South America. Conditions in Cuba are not such as to invite American labor. The sugar plantations there must always be worked by Spanish Americans or people from the south of Europe.

Everything herein set forth as having come out in testimony before the committee emanates from Cubans and their friends who are in favor of the proposed tariff concessions. It was brought out, among other things, that American capital now owns enough sugar land in Cuba to produce 1,400,000 tons per annum. The rest of the yield, up to 800,000 tons, is owned and controlled by Cubans or Spaniards, many of whom are non-resident, holding their land in trust for others living in the island, have not renounced their Spanish allegiance. Only 7 per cent of the sugar plantations in the island are owned by native Cubans. Cubans who appeared before the committee give the lie direct to a theory that has become current in the west and northwest that Cuba is a "land here, which will mean industrial and commercial stagnation."

No Market in Europe.
It was stated positively to the committee by Cuban witnesses that their country now has a market in Europe for sugar. Cuban sugar is sold in Spain, even in the old days, and are not expecting to sell it there now. The United States always has been their sugar market, and the McKinley bill, that market has been kept open under the Dingley bill, and it is open to-day. It will continue to be open, and Cuban sugar will come here year after year, whether there are tariff concessions or not.

Questioned by Tawney.
Mr. Tawney—You are familiar with the manner of fixing the world's price of raw sugar. I would like to ask one question with reference to bringing out the fact that you would be benefited by this preferential or removal of the duty on sugar coming from Cuba. You say the price of raw sugar is fixed at Hamburg. Is that correct?
Mr. Armstrong—It will be fixed there without reference to the removal of duty on Cuban sugar.
Mr. Armstrong—You cannot have two prices of sugar in this country.
Mr. Tawney—Then the benefit of the removal of the duty on Cuban sugar will be to the consumer of sugar in the United States.
Mr. Armstrong—No, sir. But let me explain that. For instance, if a large amount of sugar is held back in Cuba until this thing passes, then, of course, temporarily it might, but in the end the Cubans will get all the benefit as long as they do not produce enough sugar to fill the market.

Would Go to the Producer.
Mr. Armstrong—I have never figured it out per acre, but whatever duty you take off it would give to the producer eventually. That is what they are asking for here.
Mr. Tawney—A gentleman here last evening stated the average sugar land of Cuba would produce 2 1/2 tons of sugar per acre; the removal of the duty would increase the value of every acre of sugar land in Cuba to the extent of that duty. The duty is about \$4 a ton and the production per acre 2 1/2 tons, so that Mr. Haves of Texas, or the sugar trust, or any American or Spaniard who has gone down there and bought these large plantations, would reap a benefit of about \$75 an acre annually on their plantations by reason of the removal of this duty.
Mr. Armstrong—They would not put that money in their pockets; nobody would invest in sugar land to sell sugar at the present prices.
Mr. Tawney—It would add that much in
