

LIGHT FROM TAFT

Civil-Military Clash of Authority in Philippines. English of Polk Presents It in Iowa House.

NOT SERIOUS, SAYS THE GOVERNOR

He Explains Points on Which Differences Existed and Says All Was Smoothed Over.

Washington, Feb. 5.—In his statement before the senate committee on Philippines to-day Governor Taft dwelt exclusively with the relations between the civil and military authorities in the Philippines. He said that originally the civil and military control of the islands had been in the hands of the military and that naturally there had been some differences of opinion as to the method of proceeding.

Compromise on Habeas Corpus.

Governor Taft continued: Our compromise was reached on the understanding that a writ of habeas corpus would not be against military officers, a civilian employe of the military branch or a prisoner of war. There have been some differences of opinion as to other matters in the method of administration and naturally the natives were more favorably inclined toward the civil government.

BATTLE WITH BOLOMEN

Seven Americans Are Killed and Eight Wounded. Victoria, B. C., Feb. 5.—Manila papers report that the archipelago of Bolomen, China, have particulars of the recent attack by bolomen on a company of the Ninth Infantry in Samar, which resulted in the death of seven of the eighteen attacked and the wounding of eight others, five seriously.

The detachment from Company E was straggling through a thickets near Dapdap Pueblo, when a large band of bolomen rushed upon them. A bloody hand-to-hand struggle ensued. The detachment plucked their rifles and, standing back to back, they swung them at the heads of the enemy.

Interest in Merger Bill.

The interest aroused by Senator Hubbard’s merger bill is intense. It appears now will be defeated. Stream, a convict received June 15, 1898, from Faribault county to serve five years for assault, was liberated to-day, having served his term less good time. He was immediately re-arrested, however, and started for Elk Point, S. D., where he had been indicted for criminal assault and other offenses. Governor Van Sant issued the necessary papers for his transfer.

Minot, N. D., Feb. 5.—C. C. Montgomery, a prominent citizen and old resident, died early this morning of consumption.

BONDS UNDER THE BAN.

Cedar Falls, Iowa, Feb. 5.—The banks have been advised to refuse to negotiate for bonds of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad and some United States bonds due in 1925, which were stolen from the New York office of N. W. Harris & Co., Jan. 7 last. Paper to the amount of several thousand dollars was taken.

DANISH TREATY APPROVED.

Washington, Feb. 5.—The senate committee on foreign relations to-day ordered a favorable report on the treaty to acquire the Danish West Indies. No amendment was made to the treaty in committee.
