

SUEZ AWAY BEHIND

Wonderful Tonnage Through the Soo Ship Canals. 1901 WAS THE GREATEST YEAR

Special to The Journal. Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Feb. 7.—The annual miles-tonnage report of traffic passing the American and Canadian ship canals at this point for the season of 1901, compiled under the direction of General Superintendent Ripley of the St. Mary's Falls ship canal, contains statistics of more than usual interest.

The total freight traffic was 23,402,065 net tons, valued at \$289,906,865, and is the maximum in the history of the canal. The tonnage exceeds that of the Suez canal, the next largest in point of traffic in the world, by approximately 19,000,000 tons, valued at \$6,000,000.

Development of the Traffic. The growth of Lake Superior commerce this past half century has been phenomenal. The total amount of value of articles which crossed the old portage of Sault Ste. Marie in 1851 to and from Lake Superior was 12,600 net tons, worth \$1,875,000.

Cut in Cost of Transportation. While the tonnage exceeded that of the previous year by 2,759,922 tons, the report shows that the total cost of transportation was \$28,222,974.07, against \$24,553,314.71 for 1900.

Maximum Records. Maximum records made by vessels during the season were as follows: Single cargo, steamer William Edensborn, 8,222 tons; barge, 3,288 tons.

Freight Carried—Steamer Presaga 166, Cleveland-Cliffs iron, 101,725 tons. Miles Run—Steamer Buffalo, New York Central & Hudson River Railroad company, 41,750 miles.

READY FOR CARVING

Brooklyn Doctor Offers Himself Upon the Altar of Science TO TEST VALUE OF VIVISECTION

New York, Feb. 7.—Dr. James Edwin Russell of Brooklyn has offered to submit his body for an indeterminate series of experiments under the surgeon's knife, to be continued until his death or physical collapse. He stipulates that his wife and family must be amply provided, for before he submits himself to the knife, Dr. Russell is old and has a long record more than twelve years in his neighborhood. He says he is an excellent subject, as he is in the prime of life, in good health and without an ounce of superfluous flesh. He is willing, he says, to make this voluntary sacrifice in the interests of science. He said: "If a man makes this sacrifice from a sudden and generous impulse he is called a hero. If he does it deliberately, with a full knowledge of the dangers, I know full well that I am a fanatic or a fanatic. I shall be called a lunatic by many and a charlatan by others, but these does not deter me from my intention. My plea is for human vivisection, and I am fully aware that in making such a plea I am shocking the sensibilities of many and am likely to incur the condemnation and active hostility of many more. But neither am I greatly concerned about that, familiar as I am with the fact that any new departure or radical measure are bound to meet the most violent opposition, often think that the cause of vivisection has suffered most at the hands of its friends and advocates."

Will Help His Carvers. I offer myself as a subject for vivisection in any direction or along any lines that may be selected. I will myself, when able not to be completely, assist my vivisectors by such notes as may be of interest to them and to me, the experimenter, by continuing until I am exhausted or until I succumb. But should I survive at the end of a year of observation and experiment I hereby stipulate that I may elect to be released from further service.

As in this volunteering in my own person to undergo vivisection and as I realize that the chances are all against my surviving, I am therefore situated solely on behalf of those who are dependent upon me and who would otherwise suffer by my voluntary sacrifice, I have made no stipulation as to my own provision being made for their comfort and protection—the more so as all existing emoluments such as benefits, insurance, etc., will have to be forfeited and cancelled. I am thus careful to particularize that you may see that I have a full appreciation of the magnitude of the offer I make, that the same is not a gratuitous or bravado spirit, but is submitted in good faith and an earnest purpose and a conscientious conviction that a man is no less worthy of commendation because he is a volunteer than because he is a soldier in the ranks of a regular army.

WISCONSIN. MEMORIE—Mr. and Mrs. John Moody arrived from Chicago with the remains of their daughter, Alice, who committed suicide.


