SPRINGS COLLAPSE OF PLAN

There Will Be No Universal Code of B. B. Rules.

"BAN" DOESN'T ACCEPT RULES

And It Is Intimated That American Association Will Follow His Lead.

Chicago, Feb. 13.—It is stated that President Ban Johnson of the American League after consulting with Umpire Jack Sheridan and Hickey, in yesterday's American association, the latter having just returned from the east, authorized the announcement that the American League will not accept the new rules framed up at the Buffalo meeting.

It is also predicted in baseball circles that Hickey will follow Johnson's lead. This means the complete collapse of the plan of formulating a universal code of rules under which the games in all leagues, both professional and amateur, were to be played.

The Winner in Yesterday's Races at Lake of Isles.

D. W. Thurston's beautiful mare, Cora B., demonstrated her right to the title "Queen of the Trotters" in yesterday's matinee by winning the Directum free-for-all in an easy manner. Hayden's new pacer, won in an easy manner, being headed at no time, but Elsie Oh So, the grand going daughter of Oh So, and winner of all her races up to date, gave him a horse race and clearly showed she outclassed the balance of the field.

Warren D. E. Hayden's new pacer, did not sum up to his usual good form and could do no better than fourth. Redrath finished second the last heat and was second in the first.
