**OLD WOMAN WAS FROZEN IT HAS THE UPPER HAND**

**SHE HAD A FORTUNE OF \$25,000 SMALLPOX STIR IN DES MOINES**

Mad Disclaimed the Church and a Lutheran Minister Refuses Last Services.

Des Moines, Iowa, Feb. 14.—The city council has decided to close all churches and theaters and to prohibit all public gatherings until the smallpox epidemic has abated. Mayor Harbenower will at once employ 100 men to enforce quarantine and physicians to vaccinate all who have not been vaccinated.

Great excitement prevails, as the state board of health has threatened to quarantine the city in seven days if some steps are not taken to prevent the spread of the disease.

Dr. Rupert Blue, of the United States military hospital, stated to-day that in all probability some action would be taken to compel the fumigation of mails.

**FIRE AT ESDALE**

**A Western Wisconsin Town Loses Three Store Buildings.**

Red Wing, Minn., Feb. 14.—The general merchandise store of George Esterby of Esdale, Wis., eight miles from here, burned yesterday. The loss is \$2,500; insurance, \$1,500. The store building of Ulvin Bros. and W. W. Stickman also was destroyed, and they had no insurance. The hotel on the corner was not damaged, but saved. A chimney caused the fire.

**TO MANILA DIRECT**

New York, Feb. 14.—Practically the first direct steamship communication between New York, Hongkong and Manila will be inaugurated to-morrow by the sailing of the 6,000-ton steamer Melbourne. The service will be operated by the Philippine Transportation and Construction Company.
