The judiciary committee reported for indefinite postponement Senator McGowan's bill to legalize the incorporation of the social democratic party to change its name to the socialist party; but both reports were tabled.

In committee of the whole Senator McKusick's bill appropriating \$400 for the construction of a bridge in Washington county, was passed.

Chelmsford, Feb. 25.—Miss Ruth Crowley, the 17-year-old daughter of Matt Crowley of Covington, Ky., has surprised her father by announcing that she was married to Ralph Cleveland, aged 27, of New York, who is the nephew of President Cleveland. The groom is a son of the late William Cleveland, a brother of the president. He held a position in New York as chief clerk of the Borough of the Bronx under Tammany.

GETS MILLIONS Will Use Part of His Inheritance to Put Up a Big Hotel.

St. Joseph, Mich., Feb. 25.—Fred Emerick, who for a long time has been managing the new Mackinac hotel at Mackinac Island, Mich., has fallen heir to \$9,000,000, a share of the estates of an uncle in Germany, who died recently. The whole estate is valued at over \$50,000,000. The elder Emerick was probably the best-known European agent in the fur business. For thirty years he was a partner of John Jacob Astor. He never married.

MISSIONARY IS DEAD Rev. Joseph W. Cook to Be Buried on Yankton Indian Agency.

St. Louis, Feb. 25.—Rev. Joseph W. Cook, pioneer of Indian missionary work in Wyoming and the Dakotas, is dead of a malarial fever. He was on his way to Florida, and becoming unable to travel, was compelled to stop in St. Louis. He went to St. Luke's hospital, where he died of the disease. He was a partner of John Jacob Astor.

HE LOOKED SO REAL Even Hebrew Shopkeepers Couldn't Detect Jo Welch's "Make-up."

WAYM IN THE WOODS Loggers Are Worried Because Ice Roads Are Thawing.

DANGER OF LOGS BEING HUNG UP In the Meantime, Owners of Lumber Stocks Are Watching Developments Closely.

The hard roads of ice and snow in the northern woods are suffering from the warm weather. The loggers fear that the damage done by the melting of the roads by the thaw will interfere greatly with their plans of getting the logs out to the river banks and railroads. The lumber market is suffering from the fever of uncertainty. How long will it last depends upon the weather that follows the present thaw.

Before the warm wave gently enveloped Minnesota, everything was nicely adjusted. The following instructions had been sent to the loggers. An immense amount of logs has been cut and decked ready for hauling to the river banks and railroads. Things were moving so smoothly that lumber manufacturers were confident of a big log supply at the mills next summer. But the warm weather has made it impossible to keep the highways in shape for next hauling in the hope that the winter will be a hard one. That will not be followed by a freeze and a reasonable fall of snow is the prayer of the lumbermen. In the meantime, the owners of the lumber are figuring on possibilities. Whether to sell stock now on hand or not is the question. If the weather turns cold and prices move up smoothly, the loggers continue unfavorable, enough to interfere with the transportation of a portion of the cut, the price goes up. For a few days "it" is a big word with the lumbermen.

LAW NO EXACT SCIENCE SHOWN BY MERGER DECISION Attorneys for Northern Securities Didn't Suggest Grounds on Which Court Acted.

Senator George P. Wilson, one of the associate counsel for the state in the Northern Securities case, said this afternoon: "I cannot say that I am surprised at the decision of the supreme court in the merger case. At no time did I believe the court would take jurisdiction if it could avoid it. Every state has similar provisions and it was entirely proper for the court to establish what that court doubtless regarded as a dangerous precedent, that is, one that would impose too much labor upon that court."

The decision determines the fact, or principle rather, that law is not an exact science. The Northern Securities company employed three distinguished attorneys, as counsel to assign reasons why the supreme court should not take jurisdiction, and in their brief of forty pages they made no mention of the fact that the Northern Pacific or Great Northern were necessary parties. Upon the oral argument they expressly stated that they would not suggest that the court should take jurisdiction, but they did suggest that the state's suit is to preserve the integrity of the corporation, and to prevent their spoliation by a foreign corporation.

The conference having decided to change the time of meeting from February to May in order that the smaller congregations might be able to entertain the conference.

PROTECTING CHINA United States Trying to Lighten the Indemnity Burden.

Washington, Feb. 25.—The United States government has proposed to the powers concerned in the Chinese treaty that they consent to a pro rata reduction of claims to 50 per cent. The total value of the claims is \$50,000,000, and the powers agreed to accept from China as full indemnity for the Boxer outrages.

BANISHING CIGARETTES Preparatory School of Northwestern University May Be Wrecked.
