In Labor's Field SHARING OF PROFITS

How Plan Has Worked With Pillsbury-Washburn Company.

ERRONEOUS MAGAZINE ARTICLE

Several Concerns That Have Adopted the Plan With Considerable Success.

A recent issue of Alliance Magazine in the Pillsbury-Washburn flour mills of Minneapolis among the noted profit-sharing industries of the United States. In that article H. E. Armstrong says the Pillsbury mills pay a cash dividend to salaried earners, skilled laborers and those who have worked with the company five years, when the profits exceed eight per cent interest on the investment. Continuing the article reads:

All the excess apparently doesn't go to the employees, and in 1888 and 1889—the system was introduced in 1882—there was no dividend to labor, because of a steady decline in breadstuffs. In 1883 and 1888, \$40,000 was divided, and there has been a distribution every year since, when the eight per cent and more was earned.

Inquiry at the office of the Pillsbury-Washburn company reveals the fact that no such dividend has been paid to salaried earners or skilled laborers in the last ten years.

No such dividend has been paid in that time, said Henry Little, manager of the company, who has managed to pay a dividend annual profits during the last decade have not exceeded eight per cent on the original investment. The fact is that the company has managed to pay a dividend to common stockholders during that time.

In the twenty years since the system was introduced, the mills have paid a dividend to labor seven times.

Other flour companies are Ballard & Ballard, millers, of Louisville; Haines, Jones & Cadbury, plumbers and steamfitters' supplies of Philadelphia; the Columbus Milling and Flouring and grain companies; the Riverside Press, Cambridge, Mass., and the Proctor & Gamble Soap company, Cincinnati.

The Ballard & Ballard company has had a profit sharing plan for more than ten years. Fourteen years ago it employed a head miller at a stipulated salary, and agreed to give him ten per cent of the profits in addition. From this beginning a complete scheme of sharing profits has been developed. The company has never had a strike nor the employees a grievance—a condition which is fairly analogous with the relations which obtain between the Pillsbury-Washburn company and its employees.

The Haines-Jones company commenced the profit-sharing system in 1887-88. In three years \$30,000 was distributed among the employees. The Columbus Street Railway company pays all its employees the same dividend on wages that the stockholders receive, etc.

The Riverside Press allows a share in profits by paying an extra interest on savings, which may not loom large as a benefit, but encourages thrift.

The Proctor-Gamble company adopted profit-sharing in 1887 as a protection against strikes, there having been fourteen such disturbances at its factories the year before. The company and employees have had no trouble since.

DEFEAT OF TAX CODE

How It Affects Minneapolis Organized Labor.

The defeat of the new tax code in the legislature relieves organized labor in Minneapolis from a somewhat embarrassing position. After the report of the tax commission had been made public considerable pressure was brought to bear on the local organizations representing organized labor to give the bill official consideration, with the purpose of taking action either for or against its adoption. But the response was not encouraging. Organized labor has generally favored a cautious attitude toward the question. The Trades and Labor Council, the most representative labor body in the city, has refused positively to give the bill its official attention. It first showed its temper in the matter by turning down hard the delegation from the Duluth labor organization that appeared to ask its cooperation in its proposed defeat of the bill, and has resolutely followed the same policy of noninterference since.

The Building Trades Council was not quite so steadfast in its policy, yet insisted upon full and careful examination of the bill before taking any action on it. The council under pressure consented to take the matter up at its meeting, but the cautious course of naming a committee of its members, which included one lawyer, to give the bill a thorough examination. The committee was expected to report at last week's meeting, but instead asked for more time. Now the tax bill is dead and the council will presumably not consider it.

The Federation Council, the executive committee of the State Federation of Labor, alone took an active hand in the matter, going on record in favor of the postponement of any action until the next meeting of the legislature.

IOWA'S CONVENTION

It Will Be Held at Cedar Rapids, May 14.

The state convention of the Iowa State Federation of Labor will be held in Cedar Rapids May 14. One of the expected results of this year's convention is the appointment of a state organizer who will visit the entire state in the first of the month. There are nearly 40,000 workmen under the state federation. Organized labor in Iowa has made satisfactory progress this past year, and the results have been encouraging. Wages have been increased in many cases, hours of labor shortened in many others, conditions modified in favor of the workmen, and recognition secured for union labor in places where it has been denied before.

QUESTION OF AFFILIATION

One of the Problems Before Minneapolis Unions.

The question of affiliating with the American Federation of Labor will be perhaps the most important matter for consideration by the Minneapolis unions in the coming weeks. The Trades and Labor Council is expected to meet in the near future to affiliate with the federation, but an appeal was taken and the matter is now before the unions themselves. The Woodworkers' union is the first to act in the matter, voting at its meeting this week in favor of the proposition.

Labor leaders are in considerable doubt regarding the advisability of the move. One of the arguments made against affiliation is that it would result in the loss of the Trades and Labor Council of some of the unions that have been the most active in bringing it up to its present high state of efficiency. Advocates of the proposition, on the other hand, insist that affiliation with the federation would be of great assistance to organized labor, being in the direction of further centralization of the labor movement.




