RIDE ON LOCOMOTIVE

2,099 MILES

Marconi Virtually Bridges the Atlantic With His Wireless System.

New York, March 1.—Mr. Marconi, who arrived on the Philadelphia-to-day, announced that during his whole trip across the Atlantic he was able to talk with the station at Port-au-Prince, without difficulty up to 2,099 miles, virtually bridging the Atlantic.

FRENCHMEN UNDISMAYED

'BOOM' FOR MISSIONS

PITTSBURG'S WETTING

Western Part of Pennsylvania in the Grip of the Flood.

Pittsburg, March 1.—Western Pennsylvania is in the grip of the worst flood since the record books began to be kept. At 9 o'clock this morning measurements showed thirty feet of water and it was still rising at the rate of five to six inches an hour.

POTOMAC BOOMING

Shenandoah River Likewise Getting Very Lively.

Washington, March 1.—The Potomac and Shenandoah rivers are rapidly rising to-day. The worst trouble on the Baltimore is rising about as rapidly as that of Cumberland, where the Potomac has risen eight feet this morning.

FALLING AWAY

Waters North and South Seeking Their Normal Level.

Reading, Pa., March 1.—The flood in the Schuylkill river has subsided to its normal level and is steadily receding. All further danger is passed. Immediate immense damage has been wrought in this vicinity.

FORGED NOTES

Norwegian Confesses Crimes in His Native Land.

Chicago, March 1.—Paul Halseth, who fled from Christiansund, Norway, last August, was arrested to-day by Deputy United States Marshal Case on a charge of forgery preferred by the Swedish government. He was taken before United States Commissioner Foy and after presenting a signed confession was held for extradition.

SOO MAN KILLED

Struck and Mangled by a Canadian Pacific Engine.
