PREPARED FOR FAIR

Officials Have Already Settled Matter of Live Stock Exhibits.

PREMIUM LISTS ARE EXPANDED

Effects of Big Blooded Stock Sales Felt Throughout State Already.

Although it is nearly six months until the opening of the Minnesota state fair of 1902, preliminary work looking to the success of the great northwestern show is going on continuously. Much attention has been paid to arrangements for the livestock display. Secretary Randall says that the plans for the best and dairy cattle exhibits grow on his hands every day and that there is now no question but that these classes will surpass in interest and value any that have been seen in the northwest—or anywhere else for that matter. In beef strains there will be national displays by the Hereford and Shorthorn breeders' associations while the Aberdeen-Angus association will enlarge its premiums by generous additions to the regular fair premium schedule. In the recent past the National Holstein Freisian Breeders' association will put up \$1,100 in premiums which will have the effect of getting out a fine display of rival breeds.

But the cattle will not have it all to themselves. The growing interest in sheep and swine, will add materially to the premium offers in both these classes and will make provision for additional exhibition room. In fact a large new sheep barn has already been erected on the fair grounds. In some of the swine classes premiums have been increased by the addition of third premiums where there were but two before, or of fourth premiums where there were but three, and so on.

At this time when there is such a large expansion of the farming industries in the northwest many farmers are coming from other states to make their homes in Minnesota and the Dakotas, this attention to live stock is especially pertinent to them. Many farmers who are establishing themselves in Minnesota are good stockmen—men who believe in having cattle, sheep and swine on their farms and who want the best "stock up" with the best. That there will be a goodly contingent of this class of buyers at the Minnesota state fair next fall goes without saying. The established farmers of the state are buying more and more livestock each year and are better able to do so after each successive crop. The effects of the already mentioned sales are already noticeable; and such effects are already in their development.

Vice President Chester R. Smith, of St. Paul, is looking up the arrangements for the next fair and reports that contracts for a fire-works display of great magnificence are already about ready for ratification.

Work on the fair grounds is being planned and carried out as far as weather will permit. During the winter the secretary's offices in the administrative building have been overhauled and put in good condition.

GETTING INTO SHAPE

The committee on plan of promotion of the National Employers and Employees convention to be held in Minneapolis September, will probably engage committee headquarters in a few days and take up in a practical way the work of pushing the arrangements for the convention. It was the sentiment of the committee to have the convention engaged at once and that literature should be prepared and sent out at the earliest possible date.

NEW MEAT MARKET OPENED

By the Powers' Mercantile Company Saturday.

Among the late improvements in the city is the Sanitary Meat Market, at Powers' Mercantile Company, which was opened Saturday, and of which Witt Brothers, who have been so long and favorably known as meat men in Minneapolis, are managers. A finer display than was shown at the Sanitary Meat Market, Saturday, would be hard to find this side of Chicago. The space has been more than doubled, more that was used in the former market has been replaced by new appliances. The rooms are well lighted, and a special feature of the establishment is that the compartments which have been provided for each variety of food.

"First we found out that some varieties of meat should not be roasted in the same oven, because of mixing the flavors, now we have learned that some kinds of meat should not be hung together for the same reason; and that, finally, the difference in temperature required for proper maturing," said Mr. Witt, while he was explaining the intricacies of the great refrigerator.

The immense size and modern appliances of this cold storage plant, enables the Sanitary Market to keep meat till it has attained just the proper age to bring out the right flavor. The poultry and pork were found in a compartment by themselves. A compartment for butter, and one for cheese, different compartments for beef and lamb, at various stages of ripening for the table were shown. The dairy department is one of the most complete in the city. The fish and shell-fish have accommodations in the refrigerator entirely separated from the meat. At one side of the store fish and poultry are dressed to suit the customer, on marble tables especially prepared for the purpose.

The accommodations for green vegetables and fruit have been enlarged, and a full line of the season's necessities and delicacies are furnished. "It is our intent to furnish the best of everything that can be obtained in our line," said Mr. Witt, as he turned to his pet scheme of intercommunicating telephones, fourteen in number, ranged along the counters, and so connected that a customer at her home may call up any particular clerk who may desire, and not be obliged to wait for him to go to a distant part of the store to receive her directions.

Twenty-five men are employed in the department outside of the delivery men. The automatic cash system is used, and to assure the utmost promptness in service, four cash registers have been supplied. Over 3,000 cartons were given to customers Saturday.
