MUSICAL AFFAIRS

The concert and the paper on "Impressionism in Painting," given by Robert Koehler last evening at the public library art gallery called out a large audience of cultivated people. The program was most interesting in each part.

The musical numbers were given by Miss Amalia Rippe, soprano; Gustavus Johnson, pianist; and Heinrich Hoewel, violinist, artists whose work was well and are fully appreciated by Minneapolis people. The program was delightful in its selection and rendition. The accompanists were Miss Vera Golden and Arthur Strauchauer.

Mr. Koehler in his paper referred to the suspicion not unshared with dislike with which unfamiliar things in art are viewed and on this ground explained much of the criticism of impressionism in painting. Popular taste is not yet educated up to the new truths of painting as interpreted by the impressionists, whose work is the distinguishing achievement of the last half of the nineteenth century.

He assured his hearers that the new methods of painting were founded upon sound scientific principles and would endure and, if people did not like the truth, that was their misfortune.

To illustrate the absurdities of the stock collection of pictures as "Not true to nature," Mr. Koehler told the story of Turner, who had been rebuked by a critic who told him that he did not believe such effects existed in nature for he had never seen them. To this the painter replied, "No; but don't you wish you could see them?" Mr. Koehler continued, "No man will ever reproduce nature and no artist will ever try to do so. The best he can do is to draw a parallel to nature to suggest her various phenomena, to translate into his own feelings such of her qualities and appearances as appear to his sensitive capacity."

To the impressionists Mr. Koehler attributed some of the most important discoveries in art, the effect of atmosphere, the interpretation of color, the light and moving life. Deep study of nature and scientific principles had enabled painters to throw off the thrall of tradition and conventionality and to develop individuality in art.

Childe Hassam's work was adduced as a worthy illustration of the new methods, and his keen observation, charming color and refined sentiment were called to attention.
