





### "THIS IS DIFFERENT"

Secretary Hay Explains the Thomas Passport Matter.  
Washington, March 15.--Secretary of State Hay says in his letter to Representative Hitt regarding the application made to the state department in behalf of Dr. Thomas and wife for a request to the British authorities for passports to enter the Boer lines in South Africa: "A young gentleman called and asked whether this department would issue passports to the Rev. Mr. Thomas and Mrs. Thomas who were intending to go to South Africa for the purpose of distributing funds which had been collected in Illinois for the benefit of the sufferers by the war. I said at once the department would issue the passports desired and that I would also give Mr. Thomas a letter commending him to every one whom I could influence and asking their assistance in his errand. Inquiry was then made whether this government would ask of the British government permission for Mr. and Mrs. Thomas to go at will through the British military lines and camps, a suggestion which I thought impracticable. This department is ready at any time to consult with a representative of Governor Yates as to the best means of getting into the proper hands sums contributed by charitable people in Illinois for the relief of the sufferers by the war."

### MINNESOTA

ST. CLOUD--Joseph C. Goddard, of Crow Wing county, has filed on a piece of government land. In July, 1883, Jonathan Shell made entry on this land and has resided there ever since. After the stipulated five years had passed, he attempted to make final proof, but he refused to take out his final citizenship papers. Shell is said to have threatened to shoot any one who attempted to take his homestead away from him.  
MANKATO--Frank Willies and Louis Eder were candidates for alderman in North Mankato, on opposite tickets, and both received the same number of votes. To decide the tie, they engaged in a game of euchre. Willies won.  
DULUTH--Sheriff W. C. Sargent is dangerously sick at St. Luke's hospital. His ailment is akin to brain fever. The elevators expect to begin loading wheat by April 1.  
LE SEUR--Rosa, the 6-year-old daughter of Ed Brown, was fatally burned while playing near a pile of burning rubbish.  
HIBBING--Moses Cheveret, of Duluth, was killed by a falling building in the village of Chisholm.  
WINTHROP--Peter Morton was thrown from his horse and five ribs and his shoulder fractured.  
SCANLON--The first election resulted: Chairman, E. N. Rogers; trustees, William Deming, Joseph Dugay and T. G. Farsen; recorder, F. E. Toomey; treasurer, E. J. Beauman; justices, George Law and Jerry Van Geut; constables, William Reid and Charles Esty.  
WINONA--Winona is to have a Chautauque week of entertainments here next summer.

### IN A NUTSHELL

New York--John H. Parks has an action on trial to compel John W. Gates to render an accounting of the profits he secured through the formation of the American Steel and Wire company.  
New York--It is officially announced that there are on the books of the United States Steel corporation uncompleted orders for finished products amounting to \$3,000,000 tons. Thus, at the selling prices, represented business aggregating \$300,000,000.  
Evansville, Ind.--The old Lincoln farm in Lincoln City, will in a few days be sold for delinquent taxes.  
Spokane--An attempt to dynamite the residence of Dr. P. S. Berry, mayor, was made. He had received an anonymous letter threatening to blow up his house unless he changed his political policy.  
Tacoma--The Portland flouring mill has purchased wheat flouring at Ephraim, Wilson creek, Harrington and Mehler, on the main line of the Great Northern.  
Lincoln--Nebraska farmers and grain men are concerned for the winter wheat crop, which is being damaged by the terrific wind storm.

### CABLE FLASHES

Berlin--It is denied officially that Dr. von Holleben, ambassador at Washington, will either be recalled or furloughed.  
London--The first court of the present reign, which took place at Buckingham palace, was a gorgeous spectacle, 300 presentations taking place.  
London--Lord Methuen's wound was from a bullet in his right thigh. The femur was fractured, and as a result of operation his leg will be shortened.  
Madrid--King Alfonso will be crowned according to law on his coming birthday, which will be May 17 next. The rumors concerning the king's health are false.

### IOWA

WATERLOO--Robert Anderson, road and train master for the rapid transit company, has resigned to accept a like position on the new Mason City & Fort Dodge branch of the Chicago Great Western.  
CEDAR FALLS--Miss E. Jean Patty, general secretary of the Y. W. C. A. of the state normal school, has resigned to take charge of the educational department of the Y. W. C. A. of the Harlem association of New York city.  
DUBUQUE--It is pretty well assured that Kimble, collector of international revenue for the southern district of Iowa, and Collector Patterson of the northern district will be retained.

### WISCONSIN

HAYWARD--Sheriff William Giblin has been sued for \$10,000 damages for assaulting Editor W. E. Schell of the Hayward Enterprise.  
BLACK RIVER FALLS--Hiram Hall was acquitted of the murder of E. B. Parker. The jury was a unit from the start.  
LA CROSSE--The family of Henry Barthold was saved from death by asphyxiation by the moving of a cat. A company has been organized by local capitalists to build an inter-urban electric road to Nelville. J. H. Tourtelotte, a millionaire, is the leading stockholder.  
WEST SUPERIOR--President Hill is at the head of the lakes. He says the Eastern Minnesota is preparing to ship 4,000,000 of iron ore to the docks on Alouez bay. The normal is making great preparations for the state inter-normal contest, which will be held in this city on March 25.  
ROBERTS--Peter Johnson, a farmer, committed suicide by shooting himself and was found dead by the roadside.  
RATHBONE MAY BE FREED.  
Havana, March 15.--It is reported that the court is seriously considering throwing out the case of Estes G. Rathbone, one of the accused in the postal fraud case.

### SOUTH DAKOTA

NAPLES--The Catholics are arranging to erect a fine new church building.  
RAMONA--The case of the state against Edward Collier, charged with a murderous assault upon his father, has been dismissed.  
DEADWOOD--It is likely the treasurer of Lawrence county will call in \$30,000 more 5 per cent bonds May 1. There is now on hand \$185,508.82, of which over \$105,000 was collected in taxes during February.  
STURGIS--The semiannual report of Auditor W. L. Ladd shows there was a decrease of the city's indebtedness for the fiscal year ending March 1, 1902, of \$10,199.43.  
SIOUX FALLS--Judge Carland has overruled the demurrer of the city to the cross bill of the water company, which seeks to prevent an ordinance fixing lower water rates from going into effect.

### WASHINGTON

The secretary of the treasury has discontinued the purchase of bonds because he believes that the price is unreasonably high, and that the effect of the government being permanently in the market stimulates and helps to maintain this price to the prejudice of national bank circulation.  
The senate has ratified the convention growing out of The Hague peace conference relating to the conduct of war. The most important feature of the treaty is that prohibiting the use of "dum-dum" bullets.  
The democratic congressional campaign committee decided to postpone reorganization for two weeks. The result is regarded as a defeat for Mr. Origen of Georgia, who was a prominent candidate. Those favoring a postponement were strongly of opinion that the chairman should be a western democrat.  
BISHOP EDSELL'S FIRST VISIT.

Rochester, Minn., March 15.--The first official visit to the city of Rt. Rev. Bishop Samuel Edsall of Minneapolis was made last evening, and Calvary church was filled. A class of eight was presented for confirmation, and after this service the bishop addressed the new communicants.
