JUST LIKE "TEDDY" CAREER IN THE WEST

Appointments in Iowa Made on Civil Service Lines.

DELEGATION WAS SLOW TO ACT

Whereupon the President Reappointed Patterson and Kemble Whose Ratings Were High.

Special to The Journal. Des Moines, Iowa, March 26.—A stirring tale of the method adopted by President Roosevelt to make the congressional delegation remember the commandments of civil service comes from Washington. This is nothing less than that the president, without waiting for the delegation to caucus, has decided to re-appoint the present United States internal revenue collectors for Iowa, John W. Patterson of Dubuque for the northern district and John M. Kemble of Burlington for the southern district. The latter part of last week, Patterson and Kemble received the presidential orders for the ensuing terms. The secretary said the president's orders were that these be filled out and returned. Patterson is known to have sent his bond back, properly filled out. It is expected Kemble will do so without delay. When the facts leaked out here but one construction was put upon them. The delegation has put off selecting the collectors for month after month. It should have acted last May. Next Saturday was finally set as the time for acting. But the president has anticipated the caucus. It is known he caused the rating of both men under the civil service requirements to be looked up. He found Patterson and Kemble were rated very high, one having 100 points and the other 98. Learning this, the president decided there should be no more dilly-dallying and that the civil service requirements should be carried out, even if it was necessary to shy a brick at the powerful Iowa delegation.

Hopkins, Slain by Kipley, Known at Head of Lakes.

ALMOST MET DEATH AT DULUTH

How "Red" McCormick Figured in Getting Him into a Desperate Scrape.

Duluth, Minn., March 26.—When Daniel Kipley, ex-detective of Chicago, shot Joseph Hopkins with fatal results in that city a few days ago, he killed a burglar who first attracted the attention of the police when in St. Paul in 1891. It was in order to clear up a mystery to the authorities at the head of the lakes, who, ever since 1892, have wondered whether Hopkins was dead, or, if alive, leading an upright life or continuing a criminal career. In 1891 and 1892 "Red" McCormick, so-called because of his fiery red hair, tried to get on the soft side of the police by getting a commission as a plain clothes man under Chief Evans of Superior. He argued that it takes a crook to catch a crook, and that he ought to be given a job. In order to make a showing according to the police, McCormick cast about for victims. He is credited with having written to Joe Hopkins and "Punch" Mahoney in St. Paul and told them to come to Superior and turn a trick that he could put them onto. They knew "Red," but did not know he was double crossing his old acquaintances, and they followed his tip. He sent them to burglarize the house of a groceryman named Hicks. Mr. Hicks meantime was told to look out for burglars and he was sitting up waiting for them. Hopkins and Mahoney when they entered his front door about midnight with skeletons in their faces, Hicks poured a terrible fire at the burglars as they were ascending the stairs, and both fled, desperately wounded. They ran for ten blocks to their boarding house on the bay front where they were both arrested in a fainting condition, and sent to St. Francis hospital. A guard was placed over them, but both mysteriously disappeared one night and their recovery was assured. That same night the tug Maud S was missing from her dock for six or seven hours. Late in the morning the men were landed with friends for up the north shore and subsequently made their way to Canada. Hopkins was a Brandon (Man.) man, and his father was here at the time the boys escaped. A year later it was reported he had died as a result of his wounds. Mahoney was never heard of since. McCormick was killed in Chicago a few years ago.

IN A NUTSHELL

Chicago, March 26.—Daniel Kipley, nephew of former Superintendent of Police Joseph Kipley, was held to the grand jury by a coroner's jury for the murder of Joseph Hopkins. Lillian Arlington, known as "Diamond Lil," was held as an accessory after the fact. The coroner revealed the fact that he had been leading a Jekyll-Hyde existence, his picture being in the rogues' gallery as a burglar, while at Pat's Park he was a highly respected citizen and church attendant. Topeka—The populists and democrats have declared the federal negotiation off. Cheyenne, Wyo.—A snowstorm, which has been in progress for twenty-four hours, turned into a blizzard last evening. Washington, N. C.—James Walker, the negro who poisoned the whole family of Dr. Taylor, of the state board of medical examiners, was hanged. La Junta, Col.—W. H. Wallace, the colored sleeping car porter who criminally assaulted the aged Mrs. Miller, of Los Angeles, Cal., was lynched. When his body was strung up it was riddled with bullets. Ogdenburg, N. Y.—Frank Doran, of Deadwood, S. D., was taken ill at a party given in honor of his return to Waddington. Later he was found he had a well-developed case of smallpox. Many persons were exposed. Wilkesbarre, Pa.—Mining officials here declare that if the United Mine Workers act to restrict the output of coal while negotiations are pending for an adjustment of the miners' general lockout will probably be declared. Havana—Rathbone and Reeves have been rearrested pending their arranging to give bonds during their appeal. The former says: "The verdict is the result of General Wood's orders to those at the courts. It is a political conspiracy. I will appeal the case." Schuyler, Neb.—Because, as he says, his sympathetic nature could not bear to hear the charges against a young man, he is in jail charged with manslaughter. He saw two women drown in the Platte river without raising a hand to help them. Frankfort, Ky.—The Ferris bill, requiring the certificates of registration be issued to voters in cities and towns of Kentucky, without the presentation of which at the polls on the day of the general election no such voter could exercise his right of suffrage, will not become a law for the reason that the enrolled copy of it has been either lost or stolen. Berlin—The department of agriculture has gathered samples of European meat products. These meats show a general use of borax and that some sausages contain borax in large quantities. Chemicals are much more largely used in the preservation of meats in Germany than in the United States, because the system of cold storage used in the latter country is little in vogue here.
