### "STEEPLE JACK'S" ESCAPE

Presence of Mind Saves Him in a Fearful Fall.

Port Chester, N. Y., March 28.—Frank Patterson, a "steeple jack" of Port Chester, owes his life to the good grip he exerted when he fell from the top of a flag-pole 130 feet high yesterday, and held on to a ledge sixty feet above the ground until rescued. He escaped with only slight bruises on his right arm.

Patterson was making alterations on a pole on the tower of Edgewood Inn, when the pole snapped in two. Patterson let go his hold and went flying through the air. Without losing his presence of mind,

he grabbed the stump of the pole and rapidly slid down it to the tower. When he reached this footing his hands slipped, and the shock caused him to slide from the tower to the main roof.

When he rolled towards the edge of the roof he got a good grip on the ledge of the roof and held on, thus saving himself from being crushed to death on the ground sixty feet below. Fellow workmen rescued him.

### ARRESTED FOR A MURDER

CORONER ACTS ON JOHNSON CASE

Gustaf Erickson Under Strong Suspicion for the Foul Crime Near Alexandria.

Alexandria, Minn., March 28.—The coroner's inquest over the body of Magnus Johnson, who was shot to death Monday afternoon, was finished yesterday. The post mortem examination was made by Dr. Syng. There were four bullet wounds in the face, three on the right side and one almost between the eyes. One bullet entered the right cheek, passed into the head, going slightly upward, and lodging in the skull. One ball passed into the head just in front of the right ear, cut the temporal artery and also lodged in the skull. Another entered back of the right ear, passed backward and downward and had apparently lodged in the spinal column and was not found. This wound probably caused Johnson's death.

The first probably struck him in the forehead and knocked him down. Then the murderer had stepped around the back of the house and deliberately shot him again three times. The bullets found were from a 22-calibre revolver.

The coroner's jury returned a verdict of murder against Gustaf Erickson, about 18 years of age. On Saturday, young Erickson was in Alexandria and bought a 22-calibre revolver. He had been at some of Johnson's neighbors on Sunday with this revolver and shot at a mark with boys. He left that neighborhood some time Monday afternoon. He had no settled home here, but was something of a tramp and had lived around among the farmers for some four or five years. He had recently said he would go back to his mother in Michigan as soon as he could

get some money. He was arrested to-day at Barnesville.

### THOUSANDS OF WEAVERS STRIKE

Fitchburg, Mass., March 28.—The strike at the Otseville, R. I., mills of the American Woolen company in opposition to the system whereby a weaver is required to operate two looms, has spread to other plants of the company until to-day nearly 3,000 employes, nearly all weavers, are out. The mills involved are at Otseville, Manon and Passang, R. I., and Plymouth, Blackstone and Fitchburg, Mass.
