Treatise by Congressman McCleary on the Lumber Interest in This Connection.

MARRIED ON A DEATH BED

MRS. DOOLEY DIED IN FEW HOURS

Duluth Woman Desired to Provide Her Daughter with a Good Home.

Washington, March 28.—In a letter in response to one from the Protective Association of Maltrato, Minn., on the lumber tariff, Representative McCleary says: "There is, evidently, some uneasiness over the tariff. So there was in 1892. Of course you and I know that, then as now, most of that uneasiness was not well founded, but was stirred up and cultivated by the opponents of the protective tariff system."

Mr. McCleary reviews the campaign questions of 1892 and 1896 and the victory for honest money and good prices. And now that "good times and good prices" are again prevalent, the old cry of 1892 is again being raised. But I have too much respect for the American people to fear that they will so soon, by again led into the slough of despond. As practical business men you know, of course, that the price of lumber today is higher than it was in 1892-7, like the price of most other things, chiefly because of the greatly increased demand for lumber, by reason of the fact that our people everywhere are doing well and are building and improving homes. But if, from any cause, the purchasing power of our people should be reduced, the price of lumber, as well as the price of other things—including the labor of the workman and the crops of the farmer—would fall fast enough and far enough to satisfy even those who are now so ardently demanding lower prices for the things they have to buy.

Duluth, Minn., March 28.—In the face of approaching death, Mrs. Alvina E. Ballow of West Superior was married last night at St. Luke's hospital to John P. Dooley, West Superior. A few hours later Mrs. Dooley died of such pathetic circumstances, passed away.

Mrs. Dooley went to the hospital Monday and an operation was performed Tuesday. It was understood that it was soon known that she could not recover.

It was with this knowledge at a late hour last night that hurried arrangements for a marriage were made.

Just as soon as a license could be procured and a minister summoned, the ceremony took place at the bedside of the dying woman. She sank rapidly after it, and death came at an early hour this morning.

Besides her husband of a few hours, Mrs. Dooley left a daughter. It is said that one of the reasons the ceremony was performed with death approaching was that the daughter would thus be cared for.

Mr. Dooley is local freight agent of the Eastern Minnesota railway at West Superior, and his wife was a bookkeeper for Peyton, Kimball & Barber.

JUDICIAL DISTRICTS

Senator Hoar's Bill Redrafted to Accommodate South Dakota.

Washington, March 28.—A bill embodying a comprehensive readjustment of the judicial districts of the United States has been introduced by Senator Hoar. It provides for fifteen circuits, an increase of six. Minnesota, Wisconsin and Iowa comprise the thirteenth circuit, and North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Wyoming, Colorado and Utah embrace the fourteenth. The bill divides judicial districts originally offered by Senator Hoar provided for nine circuits. As arranged this reclassification did not meet with favor and as a result the number was increased to fifteen.

In the case of South Dakota objection was made to including that state with Colorado. For this reason the South Dakota practitioners would be obliged to go to Denver instead of St. Paul or Omaha.

The present measure provides that the several circuit judges now in office shall continue to be circuit judges for the circuits in which they have their domicile, 1902, is said to be the additional clerk in the order of seniority. The present clerks of circuit courts are to remain in office until the additional clerks are to be appointed as provided by existing law.

INGENIOUS PRINCESS

Alleged Forger of Cecil Rhodes' Name Committed for Trial.

Cape Town, March 28.—The hearing of the charges against Princess Radziwill, accused of forgery in the Cecil Rhodes case, is in progress. The princess is committed for trial on a charge of forgery. She was committed to prison at 2,500. It was furnished by herself and two sureties. Evidence showed that last August Princess Radziwill received two telegrams, sent from Cape Town to Kenilworth, Cape Colony, and purporting to be from B. A. Hawksley, counsel for the British Chartered South African company. The princess subsequently bribed a junior clerk in the telegraph office at Kenilworth for 30 shillings to insert London as the office of origin of these telegrams. She then showed the messages to a firm of attorneys as cablegrams from Mr. Rhodes' solicitor. This was done with the object of securing a low rate of discount on a bill for £2,000.

The princess cabled advertisements in which she repudiated his signatures to all bills, but Princess Radziwill afterwards attempted to discount notes for £2,000 and £5,000, and in doing so she was detected. The princess includes seventeen counts for forgery and fraud and a charge of contravention of the telegraph act.

COMPROMISE CANDIDATE

West Superior Republicans Are Casting About for One.

West Superior, Wis., March 28.—According to the decision by Judge Vinje the republican party has now no nominees for the office of mayor in the field. The decision declares that both republican conventions, were illegal. Just what step will be taken is not known.

Ditrich is willing to withdraw, and an attempt is being made to induce Parker to come to the same agreement. In case this be done a compromise candidate will be placed in the field.

DYNAMITER IDENTIFIED

Irish Nationalist Leader Tried to Blow Up Welland Canal Lock.

Burlington, N. Y., March 28.—Karl Dallman, one of the three men sentenced to life imprisonment in the Kingston, Ont., penitentiary for attempting to blow up a lock in the Welland Canal on April 21, 1900, is said to be Luke Dillon, the Irish nationalist leader and famous as a close friend of Dr. Cronin, who was murdered in Chicago. A year later the report was made that the explosion which wrecked a portion of one of the Canadian canal locks. Two of them—John Walsh and John Nedlin—were identified and their records traced. Two years ago Dillon was taker of the Dime Savings Bank of Philadelphia. Announcement was made to Dillon's friends that he had gone to Europe. A year later the report was circulated that he had been drowned in Ireland. The plot to blow up the canal failed. The men blundered in lowering the dynamite into the locks, placing it in such a position that the gates withstood the shock. It is the Buffalo Express that tells this story.

Clayton, N. M., March 28.—A mob gathered last night seeking to lynch the postmaster, John R. Guver. The night before Guver shot a man, who, the official claimed, intended to attack him. Sheriff Garcia and five armed deputies took charge of the jail at midnight, dispersing the mob with warning that the first one who crossed the dead line would be killed. No further action was taken.
