TAWNEY'S AMENDMENTS

He Will Offer Three Changes in Cuban Tariff Bill.

Washington, March 31.—Three amendments will be offered by Representative Tawney of Minnesota at the meeting of the committee on internal revenue.

One proposition to reduce the differential on refined sugar, another that the bill shall not go into effect until Dec. 1 next, and the third permits alcohol, a byproduct of sugar, to be manufactured without the imposition of internal revenue tax.

IN A NUTSHELL

Charleston, S. C.—President Roosevelt has decided to visit the exposition at Charleston on Wednesday, April 2.

Toledo, Ohio.—A heavy southwest gale raised a sea on Lake Erie and swelled the water in the Toledo harbor nearly four feet.

Chicago.—John P. Algeid died penniless. Mrs. Algeid would be in want if she did not possess the money she inherited from her husband.

Gillette, Wyo.—The body of B. F. Hawkins, of Guide Rock, Neb., who disappeared suddenly two years ago, was found in a hole beneath a rude shelter of bark and logs.

Phoenix, Ariz.—A company has been formed to mine copper, zinc and lead in the mountains of northern Arizona, and supply the towns on the Santa Fe and other railroads with the product during the long, oppressive summers.

Pittsburg.—A fierce windstorm struck this city and vicinity yesterday and did great damage to property and injured many people, some of whom may die. The worst results were at the Presbyterian church in Knoxville, where forty people were injured, four perhaps fatally.

CABLE FLASHES

Vienna.—A report has reached here from Constantinople that Mohammed Rehad, the sultan's brother and his presumptive successor, is dead. Foul play is suspected.

Madrid.—The king will commence May 12 with a review of 15,000 troops. There will be a grand opera performance and a concert, May 15. The ceremony of administering the oath will occur May 18. There will be popular and municipal festivities, bull fights, horse races, balls and receptions.

Paris.—The United States, seemed discouraged at the results of his trip. He denied that he rejoiced at the death of Mr. Rhodes. He would not admit that Mr. Rhodes had never lived the way would have come just the same.

Milan.—Friday night, simultaneous demonstrations occurred here and at other towns by the reservists called out during the recent riot in the city.

London.—The government has ordered the punishment of the demonstrators who show that socialism is penetrating the army.

Manila.—The Philippine commission has fixed the government rate of exchange for silver, for the second quarter of this year, at \$2.20 per ounce for one gold dollar.

WASHINGTON

James R. Garfield, son of the late President Garfield, has accepted the position of civil engineer in the army.

Powell Clayton, ambassador to Mexico, has obtained leave of absence to come to Washington to appear before President Roosevelt and Secretary Hay and defend himself against the charges filed by Senator Nelson of Minnesota.

The civil service commission will shortly institute a test system of annual examinations of its employees, which is designed to be extended to all the government service.

The democratic members of the senate committee on the Philippines have agreed upon a substitute for the government bill. It provides that the United States shall relinquish all claim of sovereignty, but that the United States shall continue to occupy and govern until the people there shall have established a government, and a suitable substitute guarantees have been obtained for the performance of our treaty obligations with Spain.
