SURGEON MIDDLETON IS DYING

Head of Iowa "U" Medical Department Poisoned at an Operation.

Davenport, Iowa, April 5.—Dr. W. D. Middleton, surgeon-in-chief for the Rock Island railway system, and head of the medical department of the state university of Iowa, is at the point of death at his home in this city, from blood poisoning.

A week ago he performed an operation for appendicitis in which there were grave scratch on his thumb and blood poisoning set in. His death is expected at any moment. Dr. H. G. Stratton, a well-known local practitioner, is also ill with the same disease. He assisted Dr. Middleton in the operation.

TWICE A MURDERER

Walter Gordon, Once of Fort Meade, S. D., Convicted in Manitoba.

 Brandon, Man., April 5.—Walter Gordon, who murdered Charles Daw and Jacob Smith at White Water in July, 1900, was found guilty at the Brandon assizes. Gordon disappeared from Manitoba after the crime and enlisted with the United States troops at Fort Meade, S. D. Later he left there to enlist with the Canadian troops for South Africa and was arrested at Halifax. His conviction was secured mainly by evidence and information secured from the officers and men at Fort Meade barracks.

BUTTE REAL ESTATE

County Board of Appraisers Raises the Values.

 Butte, Mont., April 5.—The value of Butte property is shown to have increased greatly during the past year from the report of the county board of appraisers. They Are Being Brought In Rapidly and Conditioning Has Begun.

Local horsemen are having no end of opportunity to celebrate these fine days and nights with the sun and the shade of the sunshine and good footing. At the Minnehaa track nearly 100 head of horses are now quartered, and the track is in condition for racing right now. This is the earliest season on record at 'Haha, as the trainers seldom take up quarters there before May 1. Nevertheless, at this time the racing has begun, and racing strong work, and speed making is the general order with the trainers now on the ground and all are preparing to open up by April 15.

AFTER PIKE SPAWN

Mr. Fullerton of Fish Commission in Northern Part of State.

Executive Agent Fullerton, of the state game and fish commission, is in the northern part of the state getting a line on this year's supply of pike spawn. There is said to be an abundance of spawn at Frazer, Becker county. Three years ago 3,000,000 pike were distributed throughout the state, and an effort will be made to increase that amount this year. The fish are now looking for quiet pools in the lakes, in which to deposit their eggs, and the time is opportune for gathering the spawn. The fish are caught in nets and kept in a net inclosure, where the spawn is secured and shipped to the state hatchery at St. Paul.

Broke Hurdle Record.

San Francisco, April 5.—New Zealand papers just received here say that G. W. Smith, a phenomenal hurdler, on March 8, at the Domain grounds, Auckland, broke all existing records for 120 yards over hurdles except Kneass's record of 16 seconds. Smith, paced by Martin, performed the feat in world's record time of 16 seconds. Smith will go to England to participate in the coronation games.

Foxhall Keene Recovering.

London, April 6.—Foxhall Keene was thrown from his horse yesterday while riding with the Quorn hounds near Melton Mowbray. He was not injured except with a bruise, which caused him to remain unconscious a long time. He is making good progress towards recovery.

BASEBALL

WEIGHTS AND MEASURES

These Used in the Philippines Giving Way to Metric System.

Washington, April 5.—The division of insular affairs of the war department has prepared a statement giving an account of the weights and measures in use in the Philippines. The statement says: The extension of commercial intercourse between the United States and the islands is attended with great inconvenience and expense, growing out of the complicated system of weights and measures in vogue in the archipelago. As compared with the United States' denominations and values, they are difficult to acquire and still more so to exercise, either in transactions or accounts. So far as recorded history goes, China has ruled the commercial transactions of the oriental world. That country gave a measure of weight and value, the bakwan, or custom-house tael, in the custom-house of the United States. In the custom-house of the United States, the tael is used in all transactions, and is also used among the Chinese and other eastern traders in their commercial dealings in the Philippines.

The statement concludes by noting that in the pending legislation in congress the metric system is proposed as the standard for transactions of commerce and account.

COUNSELS FORCE

Mayor of Columbus Favors Opposition to Street Railway Rule.

 Columbus, Ohio, April 5.—Mayor Hinkle has issued a proclamation advising the citizens of Columbus to resist the order of the Columbus Railway company listing the transfer privileges to passengers. Public sentiment has been rising and encounters have occurred between passengers and railway employees. The mayor advises force in resisting the order, and asks for the names of railway employees who resort to violence to enforce the order. R. D. Conner, yesterday caused the arrest of a conductor who forcibly ejected him from a car because the conductor refused to indicate in what direction he desired a transfer.

BLUE SUNDAY

Saloonkeepers Determined That New York Shall Have It.

New York, April 5.—Twenty-eight local bodies representing 8,000 saloonkeepers forming the Liquor Dealers' association of New York and vicinity, at a special meeting held last night, have decided to compel the police to enforce every blue law on the statute book next Sunday. They propose that not only small saloons be closed, but that every store and place of business open contrary to law shall be shut up as well. This move is in retaliation to the sudden action of the police in enforcing the excise law against the saloon men.

STARVING INDIANS

Twenty Thousand in Arizona Threatened With Famine.

Phoenix, Ariz., April 5.—Twenty thousand of the Saccon reservation are suffering from famine, which if allowed to continue, is certain to result in fearful mortality among the Pima and Maricopa tribes. The government is here to secure temporary relief for the Indians and to urge that the Washington authorities provide means to avert the disaster. In the meantime, the government has given water or supplies. White ranchers above the reservation have diverted all the water, and the Indians have had none for many months.

New York, April 5.—Dr. Herman C. H. Herold, collector of internal revenue for the fifth district of New Jersey, has been served with a summons in a suit for the \$1,000,000 in taxes under the war tax act. It is understood the suit is to test the constitutionality of the law.

DOTSON CONFESSED

Fiendish Montana Murderer Hanged at Deer Lodge.

Deer Lodge, Mont., April 5.—Clinton Dotson was hanged yesterday for participation in the murder of his father. Dotson went to the scaffold without fear or tremble. Just before the trap was sprung he confessed his crime. He slept to within half an hour before he was led to the scaffold. His neck was broken.

LARGE LUMBER SHIPMENTS.

Portland, Ore., April 5.—Since January 1 the shipments of lumber by water from the Columbia river have exceeded 23,000,000 feet, the largest on record for a corresponding period. Coastwise shipments have been enormous, over 15,000,000 feet going to California ports.
