President Would Do Away With Red Tapeism as Far as Possible.

He May Have a Row With the Senate Over Nomination of Crozier.

Special to The Journal. Chicago, April 8.—A special from Washington to the Record-Herald says: President Roosevelt may soon find himself in a serious row with the senate over the Crozier nomination. The president shows a disposition to fight, and is likely to have a heap of trouble on his hands before he secures the confirmation of Captain Crozier to be brigadier-general and chief of ordnance.

The speaker held that, under a long line of precedents, the bill was privileged. Mr. Newlands, (Nev.), attempted to secure a ruling of the chair upon the question of whether amendments affecting the general reduction of the tariff would be in order, but the speaker declined to rule upon a question not before the house.
