Right has been received at the Washington Park club that the filly is not recovering rapidly from a recent illness and the additional news comes from New York that she is not likely to be sent to the post until the middle of the summer.

POINTS FOR AUDITORS

Auditors on Anderson Law. Instructions have been issued to county auditors by the state auditor, with the approval of the attorney general, relative to the Anderson tax law. They read as follows: First—The sale of delinquent taxes this year should be held on the second Monday in May. The notice for the sale must be given in accordance with section 23, and the sale conducted as provided in section 24, and certificates of sale issued as near as possible in the form given in section 25. Second—All proceedings subsequent to the sale in May next, relating to assignments, are found in section 29, and title 4 prescribes the conditions under which redemptions can be made. Third—No sale of unredemmed lands provided for in title 5 can take place until after three years have elapsed from the second Monday in May, 1902. County auditors will not be required to furnish the list mentioned in section 22 until July, 1905.
