WILMOT'S WORKERS GATHER

Last of Them Expected to Be on Hand Before Week Closes.

Milwaukee, who took his sabbath down to Richmond, Ind., in order to dodge the chilly breezes of Minnesota, plunged right into a bilizard war with the edges and has been forced to give his plow crew a rest. He is no worse off, however, than Tebeau at Louisville and Watkins at Indianapolis.

Manager Wilmot is expecting the remainder of his millers to show up any day. Those who have not reported are Claude McFarland, John Morrissy, formerly in the National League, where he played at second; Catchers Laug and Beyer and Pitcher Luther, the star twirler of the Western association last year. All ought to be here this week. There is a lot of young and undeveloped material in the team, but with such a bunch of veterans as Walter Wilmot, Perry Werden and "Dad" Clarke to instruct them, they should be ready to play. Any young hopeful who fails to come to the front under such expert tutelage would better try some other line of business than baseball.

Manager Tebeau of the Louisville team has been criticized for signing Third Baseman Schaub, who is claimed by Toronto. Charles Havenor of the Milwaukee club says that if it can be proved that Schaub is a contract jumper, the Milwaukee team will refuse to play Louisville with Schaub as a member, for contracting must be suppressed and discouraged in every manner possible.

Hildebrand to Be Tried. Hildebrand, the noted Princeton twirler of two years ago, will be on the Pittsburgh team for a trial. Colonel Dryfuss announces he received a letter from the famous collegian, who asked that the contract be returned to him a trial, as he has made up his mind to take a try in professional baseball. The offer will be refused.


