SENATE IS BEHIND

Lower House of Iowa Legislature Ready to Adjourn.

BUT SENATORS NEED MORE TIME

Adjournment May Come on Friday or It May Be Put Off Till Next Week.

Special to the Journal. Des Moines, Iowa, April 10.—The house for a week past has ground out legislation at a remarkable rate. Speaker Eaton has insisted on pressing the business without relaxation. The consequence of this is that at 5 o'clock last evening the house had cleaned up its calendar and was ready to adjourn, so far as it was concerned, after passing the appropriation bills and going through the usual formalities of a legislative wind-up. What makes this state of things unprecedented is that it has been accomplished without the appointment of a house sitting committee.

The senate is behind the house. A sitting committee has been appointed and it may be possible for the session to end Friday. There is talk of prolonging it until the first of next week, but the house members are rebellious at this and are anxious to quit.

The object of this is to give it time to think up some means of getting through a bill that will answer the purposes of the Molaberry merger measure, to remove in effect the limitation of indebtedness on railroads. GOODNOW IS GOOD

Government Regards Him the Best Man It Has in the Orient.

NEW MENACE OF FREE SILVER

Considerations That Are Likely to Kill the Philippine Financial Bill.

Washington, April 10.—Since the Poulney Bigelow incident in the Minnesota university came a good many have been made at the state department regarding the opinion the department has of John Goodnow, consul general in Shanghai. It will be gratifying to Mr. Goodnow's friends in the northwest to know that in the opinion of the department he is one of the three best men the government has at present in its consular service, and the best man it has in China and the Pacific who approaches him, either in consular or ministerial position, in Mr. Conger, our minister in China. He and Goodnow are said to be really the only men in the great Pacific who have a thorough and comprehensive grasp of the Chinese question, and have been able to command the respect and confidence of Chinese officials and public men. It is perhaps unnecessary to say that the state department is paying no attention whatever to Mr. Bigelow's remarks, and will not do so. Should Goodnow continue to grow in his present field it is easy to understand that he will soon become indispensible to the state, and far far away better than that of any consular agent this country ever has had in China.

Outlook for Red Lake Treaty.

The Red Lake Indian treaty, which was sent to congress last week, will have to take its chance as a separate measure. It was the intention to have it put a rider on the Indian appropriation bill, but the senate took up that bill sooner than was expected. There will be little difficulty in passing it through the house, but a hard fight will be necessary to get it through the senate. It carries an appropriation and will be put on the "union" calendar, and can be called up only by a special rule, or a day set aside for suspension of the rules and passage of bills by a two-thirds vote. There is no doubt that it will be reported, favorably in both houses.

WAR ON MEAT TRUST

Philadelphians Sharpen Their Cleavers for a New Purpose.

Philadelphia, April 10.—The wholesale and retail meat dealers of Philadelphia, as have begun their warfare against the meat trust. The retail dealers are protesting against the raising of prices and the trade restrictions placed upon them by the trust. They are resolved to carry their fight into congress and a committee has been appointed to draft a state law to compel all meat and poultry slaughtered in Pennsylvania to be stamped so as to show where it was killed and packed. The law will also prohibit the use of preservatives in packing meat.

B. Thompson, of this city, treasurer. The chairman was authorized to appoint an executive committee of nine members acting in the absence of any existing in the membership of the committee.

KEILY OUT AGAIN

Neither Italy Nor Austria Would Accept Him as Minister.

New York, April 10.—Private advices received here confirm the rumored resignation of Chief Justice A. M. Keily of the international court at The Hague. The vacancy is to be filled by President Roosevelt. The position is regarded very desirable. President Cleveland appointed Mr. Keily minister to Italy and to Austria, but both countries objected and Keily was given the position he now resigns.
