

STICKS BY RATHBONE THE SONS FORGOT

Senator Believes an Innocent Man Was Convicted. No Appropriation in Iowa for Fish and Game Warden.

RATHBONE SOON OUT ON BAIL OMISSION WAS JUST DISCOVERED

Cuban Judges Found Him Guilty on Insufficient Evidence, It is Claimed. Warden is Certain of His Salary, but Hasn't a Cent to Work On.

Chicago, April 15.—Walter Wellman says in his Washington correspondence to Record-Herald this morning: Senator Hanna to-day won the first round in his fight for his friend Rathbone. With a day or two Major Rathbone will be released from prison in Havana. This afternoon a telegram was sent to Governor Wood from the war department by instruction of President Roosevelt, ordering the acceptance of a bond for bail for Rathbone's appearance.

Several days ago Senator Hanna arranged with the Fidelity Bonding company of Baltimore to guarantee the \$100,000 bail which the court had demanded. The court refused to accept the Fidelity as security and asked that a cash deposit of \$100,000 be made before Rathbone was released from prison. When this report was made to him Senator Hanna replied, with a good deal of emphasis, that he would not put up \$100,000 to be placed in the control of the Cuban courts, for if he should he should want some good guarantee, better than any one is able to furnish at the present time, that in case he produced his man when wanted, the money in turn should be forthcoming. This insolent demand for the cash netted the senator from Ohio, and he started out to see if a civilized method of doing business could not be applied to Cuba, at least as long as the island is under American control. The result was the order which Secretary Root today Governor Wood. The bond of the Fidelity company will be accepted, but Major Rathbone will walk out of jail, Senator Hanna's earnest stand for his friend has attracted attention throughout the country. Hundreds of letters and telegrams are pouring in upon him, commending his course. Many of the writers say they don't know whether Rathbone is innocent or guilty, but they are sure who sticks up for his friend in an hour of trouble.

Mr. Hanna is more than ever convinced of Rathbone's innocence. He has personally interviewed Americans who attended the trial every day and who declared there was not a scintilla of real evidence that Rathbone was guilty of stealing or embezzling, and that the case brought against him would not have secured the conviction of a tramp in an American police court. Three American newspaper men watched the trial, and Rathbone was convicted unjustly, and that he could not have been convicted at all had it not been for the influence which Governor Wood exercised upon the court. The five judges who tried the case there before no jury were all appointees of Wood. After his bail has been accepted, Hanna is expected to call President Palma takes office and then demand a new trial.

SUES THE CHIEF OF POLICE.


