DR. FAUDE MEMORIAL

It Will Be Consecrated at Gethsemane Church To-morrow.

BEAUTIFUL PIECE OF WORK

Two Services Will Be Held—Bishop Edsall Will Precede at Consecration.

Gethsemane Episcopal church to-morrow morning will consecrate a memorial altar in memory of the late Dr. Faude, rector of the church from 1890 to 1901.

Those interested in searching for some explanation of the lack of efficiency of the present police department can find at least a partial explanation in a brief study of the pay rolls of this and any one of the previous administrations of recent years.

The facts of the pay rolls alone point to the inevitable conclusion that there is notoriously bad management at the head of the police department, and they explain clearly enough, too, why it is that in order to get anything approaching adequate protection at night various communities of the city, like Kenwood, Sunnyside, Lowry Hill, etc., have to hire special watchmen for patrol duty and pay their wages from their own pockets.
