Washington, April 21.—Mrs. Hay, wife of the secretary of state, has laid down a code of official etiquette to end the friction which has existed for years. This was done after consultation with Mrs. Roosevelt.

MOISTURE LACKING

Winter Wheat in Kansas Reported in a Bad Way. New York Sun Special Service

St. Louis, April 21.—Says the Modern Miller Drought in the winter wheat belt west of the Mississippi river and export buying boomed the wheat markets last week. Moisture lacking over the largest part of the winter wheat territory. The only relief of consequence during the week have been in the southwest. Reports of damage and deterioration in the condition of the plant are increasing. The general condition of the crop is less favorable. The increase in the average should, however, offset the loss by damage up to the present time. Insect life has appeared, but no damage indicated therefrom as yet.
