### TAWNEY WASN'T TALL

Success Made Possible by Other Members of the Delegation.

**STAND BY THE INSURGENT POLICY**

Minnesota Congressmen Prepared to Fight on the Stump at Home If Need Be.

From The Journal Bureau, Room 45, Post Building, Washington.

Washington, April 25.—While Representative Tawney was acquiring all kinds of glory during the fight over the Cuban bill in the house and was demonstrating his ability as an organizer and a leader, the entire delegation from Minnesota was also coming in for a great deal of praise. It was generally known in Washington that the delegation did not, on the surface at least, have the solid support of the republican party in the state, and it was believed by the ways and means leaders that it did not have it all, and that in the end home pressure would be so strong as to compel Mr. Tawney and his colleagues to yield.

But it is noteworthy that the stronger the back fire the stiffer the delegation's attitude became, until in the end a position was taken which made surrender impossible. And this position was maintained until the vote was taken.

Stevens Chief Adviser.

Without detracting from Mr. Tawney's glory, a word should be said for other members of the delegation, who stood with him so solidly. Messrs. Stevens of St. Paul and Morris of Duluth, nothing conspicuous figures in the insurgent camp, and without their aid Mr. Tawney could hardly have succeeded. Mr. Stevens was especially helpful in matters of advice, where a long head, a cool head and a clear judgment were necessary. Mr. Stevens was adviser in ordinary to both Tawney and Morris, neither of whom made an important move without first consulting him. It was he who had most to do with mapping out the plan of campaign for which the insurgents strengthened that side materially, for he has the confidence of the house members in a remarkable degree.

Expecting Justification.

The members of the Minnesota delegation say they are prepared to come home and make the Cuban fight all over again, in their districts, if such a course seems necessary. They say that they have nothing for which to apologize, nothing of which to be ashamed, and that it will be a matter of considerable pleasure for them to take the question up in their districts, should there be a demand. They incline, however, to the opinion that their position will be fully justified as the fight progresses in the senate.

Elevating the Governor's Stock.

There is a disposition here to believe that Governor Van Sant's stock at home will go up several notches because of the decision of the supreme court to receive the Washington merger suit. Through this suit Minnesota, should the question of jurisdiction ultimately be decided in Washington's favor, will give many an opportunity which would have its own suit been received last winter. The Washington statute prohibiting the consolidation of competing railway lines is said to be weaker than the Minnesota statute, and so the supreme court, when it comes to write its opinion, may not have as strong a foundation as under the Minnesota law. But the Washington suit will give many an opportunity for a decision by the court of last resort definitely defining the rights of the people as against these proposed combinations of railway capital, and that is the chief matter.

Byrnes to Come in Later.

Tim Byrnes came to town a few days ago and has made the rounds of the newspaper offices and the capital, telling the boys the news in state politics. Mr. Byrnes talks well and is very popular personally. He says a good many pleasant words for Van Sant, but has thus far taken no active hand in the state fight, and probably will not until after the state convention. It is believed that he will, as usual, go on the stump for the state committee when the campaign is under way.

All Well With Button.

William Button of Minneha, Arizona, for many years a resident of Minneapolis, passed through Washington this week, en route home from a business trip to Boston. Mr. Button is more prosperous than while he lived in Minneapolis, and his gold properties promise to pay good dividends. His trip east was to confer with the managing directors. Mr. Button remains a good republican in Arizona. He is the chairman of his precinct committee and postmaster at Minneha. He talks interestingly about the complete telephone system with which the territory is provided, as the result of which lawlessness has declined perceptibly. Thieves and robbers have had to more honest pur suits, because capture is inevitable. While he lived in Minneapolis Mr. Button was with the old abstract firm, Albee & Cooley, then in Temple Court.

### BABCOCK GAVE THE WORD

NAT. ADMINISTRATION UNINDORSED

Believed in Wisconsin the Congressman Will Continue His Fight on Roosevelt.

Special to The Journal.

Lancaster, Wis., April 25.—The third congressional convention, which re-nominated Congressman J. W. Babcock and endorsed his tariff views yesterday, did not adopt any resolutions indorsing the state or national administrations. It is currently reported that the omission was made at the request of Mr. Babcock. The congressman was unable to attend the convention, but his interests were in the hands of Henry Casson, sergeant-at-arms of the house. Mr. Casson had been here for several days lining up the factions for Mr. Babcock and harmonizing the differences on the state administration.

Resolutions were passed indorsing Babcock's tariff views, but word was passed around quietly not to pass any other resolutions because Mr. Babcock did not desire it. The failure to indorse the national administration is regarded here as a sign that Mr. Babcock intends to keep up his fight on Roosevelt.

### MOVEMENT ON MOROS

General Chaffee Corroborates Report of Peaceful Tendencies.

Washington, April 25.—Adjutant General Corbin to-day made public the following extract from a cablegram just received from General Chaffee respecting the situation in Mindanao, dated Manila, April 24:

Before Baldwin could be communicated with he had taken the fort at Pulas after slight resistance. No casualties. Very soon after the neighboring town of Ganasi opened its doors, hoisted the white flag and delivered the red flag. Datto Lampok and others, with strong following, asked permission to call and make peace. Datto Amanai Pook of Ganasi, who sent a threatening message in reply to my letter, is one of those who have submitted. The camp is two miles from Ganasi, where the Sultan has asked Baldwin to come there. Have directed him not to move. It is my purpose to have an interview with General Davis. Will go on the Hancock, which leaves here to-day for Malabang, with a battalion of the Tenth Infantry.

It is our purpose to show a considerable force of troops to the lake Moros, converse with dattos, then retire the troops by different trails to Malabang and Barang, there, after to send expeditions occasionally to the lake. We supposed Ganasi to be thirty-five miles from Malabang. It is actually a short twenty-one miles. No fighting, it not being necessary to overcome the opposition to the advance to the present location of the troops. There are 75 men with Baldwin and two troops of cavalry dismounted twelve miles in the rear. Every effort will be made to prevent general war. Davis says the situation is very favorable.

### LET 'EM DANCE

Declaration That Methodist Church Restrictions Must Be Removed.

Chicago, April 25.—"If the clergy of the Methodist Episcopal church expect to keep their young men and women in the fold they must do away with old restrictions against card-playing, dancing and attendance at the theaters. If they are not allowed to follow the dictates of their consciences, they will attend churches where they will be allowed to do so, or they will not attend church at all."

This was the declaration set forth at a dinner at the Union League club, attended by sixty-five prominent Methodist ministers and laymen of Chicago. The proposition received general discussion, in which Robert Quayle said: "If we do not take active steps toward arousing interest in the church on the part of our young men and women, we shall stand alone in our old age. There will be none to take the burden from our shoulders when we pass away. If we seek to bind the young people down too closely or draw too tight a rein, we cannot hope to keep them with us. I recommend that all laymen and clergymen to whom the interests of the Methodist church are dear, organize and insist that at the next general conference the present regulations and restrictions be removed."

Another important movement set on foot at the meeting was the consolidation of all the book interests and periodicals of the church in this country.


