

Nature Smiling MR. HAUPT IS AHEAD

Purdy's Appointment Would Cause Too Much Trouble.

Mr. Purdy's Term Has Expired.

Washington, May 6 .- Administration officials are not inclined for obvious reasons to discuss the question raised yes-terday in these dispatches whether C. C. A Prominent Clergyman Tells Haupt is to be appointed district attorney for Minnesota. So far as can be ascertained to-day, however, there is no reason for withdrawing any of the statements made in these dispatches.

Whether the president will finally feel justified in insisting on the appointment of M. D. Purdy involves a question of considerable delicacy. While desirous of so doing, it may be that the president, ultimately, will be persuaded that such a course would involve the administration in more trouble than the whole matter would be worth. This is a critical mo-ment in the life of the administration, and the president naturally feels that he must have the support, as far as possible, of all republican senators. To ignore the request of the Minnesota senators for the appointment of Haupt, even assuming that Mr. Nelson's indorsement was given perfunctorily, might create unpleasant friction between the White House and the confirming power, and do more harm than

Much, of course, would depend on Senator Nelson's attitude toward the case. It is not possible to consult Mr. Nelson at present, but it is believed that he would hardly feel justified, unless the reasons advanced are the very best, in going to the extreme to consenting to Mr. Clapp's turning down, for there is always a day in court for the fellow turned, and by such a program Mr. Nelson might invite a lot of unnecessary trouble for himself. It would probably be taken to heart by Mr. Clapp's friends in the state and be used as a club in state politics in an unfair way. These views, however, do not necessarily represent Senator Nelson's views. He will speak for himself should occasion demand.

It is known definitely that the propriety of insisting on the appointment of Mr. Purdy, notwithstanding that Mr. Haupt has been recommended, has been laid before the president by the attorney general, and it is known, also, that when last heard from, the president was inclined to hold that Mr. Haupt should be appointed, even while he admitted there was much

in what the department of justice said.

Mr. Knox, seen to-day by a Journal correspondent, politely declined to discuss the matter in any way. After the situation had been cutslived as situation had been outlined to him he was asked to affirm or deny his recommenda-tion of Mr. Purdy. He declined to do either, saying that subject was not one he could discuss for publication. He added:
"There are a great many questions arising in my office which cannot be talked

about in the newspapers and this is one of them, but, while declining to talk, I decline, also, to admit that the proposi-tion you have advanced with reference to the Minnesota attorneyship is correct." But at the same time he would not deny that it was correct. It is very apparent that the matter has been thoroughly can-vassed and that the department favors the appointment of Purdy, and that the president, for large reasons of public policy, is inclined to believe it would be unwise to do as Mr. Knox suggests. Thirty-five Moros Slain While Trying to Escape.

BUT FORTY OF THEM GET AWAY

Manila, May 6.-Forty out of the eighty-four Moro prisoners who were cap-tured after a determined assault on their fort, made their escape while the troops under whose guard they had been placed, were at dinner. The other thirty-five Moros were killed as they ran. Nine were recaptured.

One of the two companies that formed the guard had stacked arms and was at mess when the Moros made a dash into the jungle, keeping the unarmed troops between them and the remainder of the guards.

The guard seized their rifles and began a heavy fire. The American markman-ship was most effective. The natives were picked off whenever they came in sight and more than half of the entire band was killed.

MGR. CORRIGAN DEAD

The Archbishop Passes Away Suddenly and Unexpectedly.

New York, May 6.—Archbishop Corrigan died last night at 11:05, suddenly and unexpectedly. Death was due to degeneration of the heart and weakness following an attack of pneumonia, the prelate being greatly enfeebled and unable to surmount the infirmities resulting from the illness. His last

mities resulting from the illness. His last moments were peaceful.

The Most Reverend Michael Augustine Corrigan, D. D., was born at Newark, N. J., in 1840. After graduating from the schools of his native place, he was sent to St. Mary's college in Emmetsburg, Md.

Leaving St. Mary's in 1859, with a brilliant record as a student, he went to Europe to take holy orders. In Rome he was one of the fifteen students who registered in the American college when it was opened. Although ordained a priest in 1863, he remained in the American college another year and won the ordained a priest in 1883, he remained in the American college another year and won the degree of doctor of divinity. Dr. Corrigan then sailed for home and reported on his arrival to Bishop Bayley in Newark, who at once assigned him to the professorship of dogmatic theology and sacred scriptures at Seton Hall college. In 1880 he was made coadjutor of Cardinal McCloskey. When Cardinal McCloskey died Archbishop Corrigan succeeded to the see of New York.


