

SETTLERS FOR WEST

12,000 Grown People Have Entered the Spokane Country.

TWICE AS MANY AS LAST YEAR

Season Opened March 2—Grand Total of 24,000 If Children Are Counted.

Special to The Journal. Spokane, Wash., May 7.—As a result of the immigration movement with reduced one-way settlers' rates, begun on March 1, about 12,000 grown people from the eastern, central and southern states and the middle west have visited Spokane.

The advance guard of this great wave of immigration reached Spokane March 3, and there has since then, a little city in a valley of prospective and bona fide settlers, with the exception of a few days tie up of the transcontinental train service by blizzards in Dakota. Yesterday's trains practically brought in the last of those holding the special one-way tickets from points east, and St. Paul. The total arrivals for the day were estimated at 160, making a grand total from March 3 to date of 11,855.

The estimates of the immigration committee of the chamber of commerce are based on heads of families and adults. It is believed that if the children were taken into account, the total arrivals would amount to as many more, or a grand total of about 24,000 people.

As compared with the immigration movement in the spring of 1901 this year's immigration is regarded as fully 100 per cent better.

A SMUGGLER'S TREASURE

HIDDEN NEAR PORTO RICO

It Has Been Found by a Party of Treasure Hunters From Illinois.

Shelbyville, Ill., May 7.—A smuggler's treasure of \$2,000,000 hidden on a small island a couple of hundred miles from Porto Rico has been found by Philo Reude and Abe Frazar, treasure hunters in the southern part of this country. During the civil war a party of half a dozen smugglers were engaged in the slave trade between Porto Rico and the United States. As there was constant danger of capture they merged their wealth, amounting to about \$7,000,000, and concealed it in a stone embankment on a small island 200 miles south of Porto Rico.

At the close of the war they started for the island to recover their hidden treasure, but the elements interfered and they were wrecked. There were but two survivors and they returned to this country. While at New Orleans they met a man with smallpox and the other being financially unable to recover the money kept his secret until just before his death, when he revealed it to his kinsman, Reude.

Just recently the latter confided in his friend Frazar and together they organized the Porto Rico Prospecting company. Several prominent citizens took stock in the company and were greatly rejoiced yesterday to get this message dated at Porto Rico:

"Amount all O. K.—Reude."

This message in italics indicates that they had found the treasure and were in possession of it.

THIS FOR PEACE

Emperor of Austria on the Situation in His Realm.

Budapest, Hungary, May 7.—"As in the past, so in the future, the constant endeavor of my government will be directed to fostering close relations with our allies as well as feelings of confidence with all other powers, thus contributing to the maintenance and consolidation of European peace."

This was the most interesting passage from a general international conference in the reply of Emperor Francis Joseph to the address of the delegations of Austria-Hungary at the recent peace conference held in this morning at Bucharest. The emperor also made a brief but important reference to the Balkan situation, saying:

"Our unvarying and friendly understanding with the Russian empire concerning events in the near east is conducive to the continued maintenance of order and tranquility in those regions."

The emperor remarked that since the last session the general political situation had in no way undergone any material change. He paid a tribute to the Austro-Hungarian forces employed in the China expedition and referred to the necessity for increasing the number of the artillery, for improving the naval stations and for "dispensable increases in the personnel of the fleets and of the construction of ships."

The delegations addressed emphasized the fact that complete preservation of the peace largely depended on a strong and lasting union of the economic forces of the two halves of the dual monarchy.

THE ACTINIC RAYS

Experiments in the Use of Them as a Germicide.

New York, May 7.—At the Flower hospital, a second experiment was made with the actinotic, the new electrical apparatus by which the actinic ray, or the violet-colored light, which has been found to be germicidal, is thrown upon the diseased parts of the body.

MAKING A RECORD
