AFTER NEW RECORDS

"Rainmaker" Hansen Will Make 1,000 Miles on Motor Cycle.

Long distance motor cycle road riding is an innovation, and no one has yet tried to establish a record for the 1,000 miles. Hansen will start on his long journey about the middle of June, arranging the time to coincide with the full moon.

He expects to ride at a rate of twenty miles an hour, which would mean fifty hours' actual riding time for the distance. Allowing for stops, Hansen thinks he can cover the 1,000 miles well inside of sixty hours.

The ride will be made over the Fort Snelling-Minnetonka course, named after the late General Snelling.

Hansen came into prominence as a long distance road rider many years ago. In 1894 he established a new record for mileage, riding 2,183 miles in the year, a feat which has since been broken.

As soon as it caught its breath, there came cries of "fake," and charges that the record was fictitious.

But Johnson repeatedly rode the mile under two minutes by several, but hardly a locomotive had covered a mile under the two minute mark since Johnson's record.

Johnson's record has since been reduced more than half a minute by riders using motor cycle pace and wind shields, which are now used.

Little Minneapolis rider made his mark. But for years Johnson's time stood, and in years to come his name will still be remembered with that of Zimmerman, one of the marvels of the cycling world.

It was after his fame as a bicycle rider that Johnson retired from the constant skating championships. He won it for two years without a rival, defeating the best men of America and Europe.

Club Golf Teams Will Contest in State Tournament.

POSTPONEMENT IS NOT LIKELY

Bryn Mawr and Minikahda Teams Arrange Qualifying Rounds for Team Play.

The officers of the State Golf association are busy preparing the program for the annual tournament, which opens on the grounds of the Minikahda club, June 26, continuing three days.

One of the features of the tournament will be a club team match. Five men will constitute each team, and the players will be pitted against Colonel Bogey.

There has been some talk of postponing the state tournament, but inasmuch as it now seems probable that neither the western nor the national contests will be put off until a later date, it is hardly possible that a change will be made.

The Bryn Mawr club has decided upon May 10 and May 17 as the dates for the qualifying rounds for the team play. The members of the team will be selected upon the basis of their medal scores, and in addition prizes are offered for the best medal scores.

The Minikahda players will use their permanent greens Saturday for the first time this year. The greens have been greatly improved since last season, and temporary greens have been used this spring during the progress of the repairs.

Saturday a club team match will be played on the Minikahda grounds. The scores will be used as a basis for handicaps in the club tournaments later in the season, and also will be considered in the selection of a team for the contests with outside clubs.

The match between the Minikahda and Town and Country clubs, set for May 24, may be called off. The Town and Country club wishes to have an earlier date set, but the Minikahda players feel that they will not be ready before the end of the fortnight, inasmuch as they have not been able to use their permanent greens.

Long distance motor cycle road riding is an innovation, and no one has yet tried to establish a record for the 1,000 miles. Hansen will start on his long journey about the middle of June, arranging the time to coincide with the full moon.
