

THE "WATCH TRUST"

A Million Dollar Corporation Formed to Fight It.

STUDEBAKER IS BACK OF IT

Tactics of the Watch Trust Were So Fierce That It Overreached Itself.

Chicago, May 8.—Opposition to the Elgin National Watch company and the Waltham Watch company, known as the watch trust, has been organized to-day in the formation of a \$1,000,000 corporation in South Bend, Ind., to supply with watch movements the large mail order houses and the jobbers of Chicago who have been cut off by the trust.

The Studebakers of South Bend and other Indiana capitalists, represented by an aggregate wealth of more than \$30,000,000, are back of the new company, which was organized by E. A. Bazzett, manager of M. Bazzett & Co., of Chicago, one of the jobbers whom the trust has refused to supply with watches at jobbers' prices.

The new company will be able to begin operation at South Bend in six months. The capacity of the new plant will be 1,000 watches a day and it will employ 1,500 workmen when in full operation.

COURTS SAY HE IS DEAD

HIS PROPERTY SOLD LONG AGO

Strange Case of Burgess or Baker of Muscatine Who Perishes in Living.

He has resided here for several years and is known by the name of David Baker. The property was sold and the money distributed and probably spent. A claim has now been made for the property.

SHE HAS TWO FEARS FIVE-YEAR SCANDAL

Mrs. Hettie Green Afraid of Lightning and Religious Lawyers.

Ex-Secretary McFarland's Case to Be Settled.

THEY KEEP HER VERY NERVOUS

The Awful Things That Have Happened in Her Family of Late Years.

MADE CLERKS DIVIDE WITH HIM

State Sued for \$5,000 Although It Lost More by Peculations of Trusted Official.

New York, May 9.—Mrs. Hettie Green, often called the richest woman in America, yesterday received a police permit to carry a pistol. In her application the reason given was that she usually had in her possession large sums of money, and she feared lightning and a religious lawyer.

For five years, this scandal of the capital, one of the most sensational in the history of the state, has been pending in the courts. In the zenith of his career, W. M. McFarland was one of the most promising and brilliant politicians in Iowa. The trouble arising in his office in 1894 and 1895 left him a political wreck and since then his fortunes have never been repaired.

Special to The Journal. Des Moines, Iowa, May 9.—The end of the sensational case against the ex-Secretary of State W. M. McFarland and his bonds-in-all-probability settlement will be made out of court, the defendant's attorneys having made a proposition of this kind to the executive council. Hence, while the case is on the supreme court docket for submission at the coming May term, it will be continued, McFarland having indicated his willingness to settle by next fall.

SUIT AGAINST SIX

Prominent Citizens of Anoka Principals in a Damage Case.

Special to The Journal. Anoka, Minn., May 9.—The coroner served papers yesterday upon John Coleman, sheriff, and principal, and John Cole, superintendent of the insane hospital, M. V. Bean, Thomas Coleman, Alderman John Casey and George McCarty as sureties, in suit in which Cyrus E. Hall asks for \$5,000 damages. The sheriff and his deputies went to the premises of Mr. Hall last summer and made a demand for certain cattle mentioned in a chattel mortgage given to the Deering Harvester company, and upon his refusal to deliver the stock until the sheriff paid the mortgage, the sheriff and his deputies are alleged to have mistreated Mr. Hall, inflicting injuries from which he is still recovering. The suit is for \$5,000. He was also incarcerated in the county jail, he demands \$1,000 for false imprisonment.

WATER CURE IN OHIO

A Variety of It is Tried at the Girls' Industrial Home.

Miss Emma Bruce of Cleveland, a teacher in the school from 189 to 1900, told the state board of charities about it yesterday. It was administered to Ruby Gregory, a girl who worked in the house at the time of Mrs. Coffin's visit, and she came back and removed something from the trunk, but so far as she recalls, did not ask for the satchel. Mrs. Coffin was accompanied by a son, about 14 years of age.

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RIDERLESS HORSE

Little Montana Girl Supposed to Have Drowned.

Special to The Journal. Helena, Mont., May 9.—Mary Hogan, 9 years old, daughter of T. S. Hogan, postmaster at Doherty, Missoula county, was drowned in Sturgis river. Her father had sent her horseback on an errand. The horse returned dripping wet and riderless. There is no trace of the little girl and there is little doubt she was drowned in the adjacent river, which is very high.

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STAGE DRIVER LOST

Wandered into the Mountains While Grazed With Pain.

Chambers, driver of a stage between Sunset and Woodworth, while crazed from pain wandered into the mountains and either fell from a cliff or been lost. His horses returned to the stage station without the stage, which was found damaged in a canyon. Chambers is presumed to have been injured and wandered to his death, as no trace has been found of him.

TO BE MUSTERED OUT

Three Iowa Companies Marked for Slaughter by Officials.

Dubuque, Iowa, May 9.—Inspection officers of the National Guard have recommended that three companies be mustered out of service because of poor attendance at drill and consequent poor averages. The guard organizations showing lack of interest are D of the Fifth at Washington, E of the Fifty-second at Hill, and E of the Forty-ninth at Independence. Adjutant General Byers will report to permit other companies to be organized to take their places unless the companies can meet the requirements as to armory.
