

Sentiment Developing for One in Iowa State.

SCHOOL FOR DEAF MUST HAVE AID

Other Business Could Be Taken Up -Ghost of the Molsberry Merger Appears.

Special to The Journal. Des Moines, Iowa, May 15.—Sentiment is growing for the calling of an extra ession of the legislature in order to meet the necessities of the school for the deaf at Council Bluffs, recently destroyed by Governor Cummins is ascertaining views of leading members of the assembly on this subject. Senator Junkin, chairman of the ways and means commit-tee of the senate, was called to Des Moines to confer with the governor on the wisdom of calling an extra session and is

inderstood to have advised it.

The executive council, if it meets the emands of the board of control for putting up temporary buildings at Council Bluffs, will exhaust the providential con-tingent appropriation of \$35,000 at the very outset of the biennial period, and in case of fire or other serious calamity connected with any of the other state instituions, the council would be left helpless.
If the assembly is called together, it will probably appropriate \$200,000 to \$250,000 for a two-story modern school building at Council Bluffs, \$35,000 to \$40,000 for temporary buildings, and make other minor appropriations, including \$15,000 for the state fish and game commission, which was forgotten in the closing days of the

ast session. Several localities in the center of the tate, including Knoxville, are preparing o make an effort to secure the school for he deaf in case an extra session is called. The objection that is urged to Council Bluffs is that it is in a remote corner of

he state and difficult of access.

The political objections to an extra session have ben carefully considered. It is the belief of the Cummins leaders that no effective criticism could be made for calling the assembly together in this em-ergency. The cost of a four or five day session will be about \$5,000. Attorney General Mullan says any business can come before an extra session that could come up at any other session and it has een suggested an extra session might revive the Molsberry bill and the railway


