MUST END THURSDAY

The Norwegian Lutheran Synod Is Hurrying Its Work.

MISSIONS DISCUSSED TO-DAY

At the Afternoon Session Officers Were Chosen According to the Slate.

A disposition to work faster was manifested in to-day's sessions of the Norwegian Lutheran Synod, for all business must be transacted by to-morrow night. Home and foreign missions were considered this morning after the devotional exercises by the Rev. J. Nordby, Lee, III. President George of the Minnesota district was in the chair. Mission committee No. 1 recommended that the church council be given power to act with reference to the Alaska mission as soon as reports from the received from Teller. Regarding work among Norwegians in Alaska, the committee urged that the three western districts be asked to aid the Pacific district. Mission committee No. 2, which has supervision of the home mission work, favored an appropriation of \$200 for the harbor missions in Christiania, Norway, it being understood that those in charge shall co-operate with the synod's immigrant committee in New York. An appropriation of \$1,500 for the seaman's mission in New York was recommended and it was reported that a similar sum was required at San Francisco.

Complaint was made that there was not sufficient interest in the Utah mission, which was reported to be doing excellent work. The Lutheran publishing house is urged to set aside \$100 for publishing tracts for use among the Mormons.

The interest in the church extension work, amounting to the income had increased by \$900. Thanks were extended by a rising vote to Oland Solheim and wife for their services at the home for the aged at Stoughton, Wis., and to J. Scalen, who retires as treasurer.

A rising vote of thanks was also given to the Rev. J. A. Ottesen, one of the pastors discharging the duties of the office of pastor, for his message of cheer and encouragement. Most of the morning was devoted to the discussion of the advisability of establishing a superintendent of schools.

The program for the afternoon session was the annual election. There will be elected for the presidency as President, Oland Solheim, who was elected three years ago, serves for six years.
