CHANGES IN RULES
The Minnetonka Club Committee Changes Regulations for Races.

Important changes have been made in the rules to govern yacht races by the yachting committee of the Minnetonka club.

The most vital of these changes affect the handling of the Houdon, Circe and Wizard are placed in a class by themselves.

The races in this class will be sailed under the old Minnetonka Yacht club rules of measurement and time allowances.

Time allowances is given in the other classes as follows: First-class sloops (ten-knot course)—Cherokee, Quavo, scratch; Hazard, 3 minutes; Breeze, 3 minutes; Kosak, 3 minutes; McLeod, 4 minutes; Lorelei, 7 minutes; Fremont, 10 minutes; Alamo, 10 minutes; Vreda, 10 minutes; Volante, 10 minutes; Charlotte, 5 minutes; Katrina, 6 minutes.

Second-class sloops (short course, twice around)—Water Witch, scratch; Nightingale, Houdon, Circe, scratch; We're Here, 1 minute; Moccasin, 3 minutes; Nememosha, 4 minutes; Aurora, 4 minutes; Sally, 4 minutes; Bird, 4 minutes; Doris, 6 minutes; Magic Slipper, 9 minutes; Pyxis, 4 minutes; Combing, 5 minutes; Warwick, 3 minutes.

One-Design Catboat Class—No time allowance. Any boat may enter. Any boat on the lake, even if not named in the table above, may enter for all races in her class.

An open class for all boats will be arranged for four or more boats to enter, in which case a pennant will be given.

The time allowances given are largely experimental, and the committee reserves the right to make changes in order properly to equalize the yachts.

There will be nine events—eight championship races and the annual cruise. Championship races will be sailed May 30 (Memorial Day), June 14, June 28, July 4, July 12, Aug. 9, Aug. 23, and Sept. 5.

The annual cruise will be sailed July 26, following the regular course from the clubhouse to Chapman's, except that Watatose and Crane islands will be left to port.

All boats are invited to enter in the first championship race on Memorial Day. The yachts should be at the dock at 10:30, at which time the preliminary gun will be fired.

The starting gun for special and first-class sloops will be fired at 10:40, for the second-class sloops at 10:45, and for the annual cruise at 10:50.

After each championship race a streamer pennant will be awarded to the winning boat in each class.




