SUGAR WAR IN SIGHT

Trust Storing Supplies in the West in Preparation.

TACTICS IN THE SOUTHWEST

It is Said They Will Be Brought Into Use in the Northwest.

Indications point to a renewal of the bitter fight begun last year between the American Sugar Refining company and the beet sugar factories for the trade of the middle west; the trust sending sugar west at a low rate and storing it so as to be in a better position to underbid the beet sugar manufacturers.

At present the trust especially active in the southwest in what is known as the Missouri river territory. Nebraska, Colorado and California beet factories have been making a bid for this trade. Last year the fight became so fierce that the trust cut the price \$1.50 per hundred in order to force the beet sugar men to give up the Missouri river territory.

The trust began its campaign against beet sugar in both the northwest and southwest two years ago by asking the wholesalers to use their influence in keeping the beet sugar factories out of the refining business. The proposition was made to have the beet refineries make a factory only raw sugar. It was pointed out that if the trust controlled the refined output, the sugar market would not be demoralized and the wholesalers would make a sure although small profit instead of being forced to do business at a loss.

The trust has been successful in getting the beet sugar men to agree to sell milk, before time limit expires. Office, room 201 Fourth street N.

Former Senator Washburn Says the Landis Resolution Can Have No Effect.

"It makes me laugh," said General W. D. Washburn, former senator from Minnesota, when his attention was called to the action of congress yesterday in adopting an amendment to the immigration bill, prohibiting the sale of intoxicants in the national capital.

"It has come to be almost an annual farce," continued the senator, "and that's all that this amendment offered by Kenesaw Mountain Landis, of Indiana, will accomplish. The congressmen who voted for the amendment were, of course, well aware of the fact that it will be defeated in the senate to-morrow, but that was the least thing to engage their attention. Whatever odium attaches to voting it down must rest upon the senate."

"I know from my own observation, as a member of the United States senate, that any such bill would fall of its purpose for the simple reason that the senators, or congressmen either, who drink to excess invariably take the ones who always have their bottle with them or have it in convenient reach in the ante room. It may be that the amendment offers to make such cases they probably take long deep draughts when opportunity offers to make up for lost time. I call to mind that just such a tippler was a certain well known senator from Kentucky, who was full of whiskey most of the time, yet was selected to take a primary room, as a matter of fact there is no very excessive drinking in either branch of the national legislature. Mind you, I refer only to the few who are so addicted to the bottle that they are adopted as drinking in the capitol. The sergeant-at-arms used to provide for any such emergency by leaving a friendly thimble member who for some reason might be unable to secure 'cold tea' in the senate or in the capitol. I was no more difficultly experienced in getting all the 'cold tea' one wanted."
