The National Holiday of Denmark
Is June 5.

WORK OF FREDRIK VII, THE GOOD

Commemorated by Observance of June 1 Here—Constitution of 1848.

Denmark's national holiday is June 5, "Grundlovs dag"—or constitution day of the present constitution. It was on that day in 1848 that Frederik VII, the king, gave to the Danish people a constitution containing so many reforms and liberal innovations that the conservative old nobles were quite aghast.

Neither by revolution nor bloodshed was the old order of things overturned but solely through the wise foresight of a liberty-loving king, whose memory will ever be honored by the people of Denmark.

The Danes of Minneapolis will observe the day next Saturday a few days in advance of the general celebration in Denmark.

The change of date here is found very desirable. The fest is arranged by the Apollo Singing societies, which have invited all the Danish organizations of the city to participate.

The exercises which will be held at Dania hall, will begin at 4 p. m., and will consist of addresses by Chr. Rasmussen, Halvard Askolund, Dr. J. C. G. Guld, James A. Peterson and possibly Governor Van Sant, who has been invited to attend.

The songs of Denmark will be sung by the Apollo society. In the evening the gathering will give itself up to social enjoyment.

A JOINT REHEARSAL
Of Six Twin City Singing Societies Under Jens H. Ehnsten.

Taking advantage of the presence in Minneapolis of Jens H. Ehnsten, musical director-in-chief for the Northwestern Scandinavian Singers' association, a joint rehearsal for the six societies in the twin cities has been arranged for next Wednesday evening at Dania hall.

As far as possible all the twelve songs selected for the grand chorus will be rehearsed. It is understood that Wollert Hildahl, Sioux Falls, S. D., president of the Northwestern Scandinavian Singers, will be present to give some information regarding the arrangements for the singfest and arouse more enthusiasm in the twin cities, which have not been needed.

The announcement that Gustav Holmquist, now one of the leading basses of Chicago, has been engaged as one of the soloists for the Sioux Falls singfest meets with the hearty approval of the singers of the twin cities. He will sing the solo in Grieg's "Landkjending," to be presented by the singfest chorus.

NOT SO "TRIVIAL"
Whole Population of Helsingfors Requests Russification.

In spite of the assurances of the St. Petersburg press that the recent outbreak in Helsingfors was trivial in itself and quickly suppressed, trustworthy advices from the Finnish capital show that the whole population of the Grand Duchy still offers firm resistance to the new army regulations promulgated with the avowed object, Russification, says the New York Times.

Out of the 387 recruits summoned to the levy in Helsingfors, April 18, only fifty-six reported. In the afternoon of that day the Cossacks charged the public in the square in front of the adjoining streets, using their knouts indiscriminately and knocking down everybody who could not escape. The chief sufferers were cripples and the aged and children. Some of the more vigorous victims offered resistance and a number on both sides were wounded. The crowds declared that they would not disperse until the military were ordered away.

The burgo-master finally succeeded in persuading General Kaigorodoff to withdraw the Cossacks.

At Viborg, also, the attempt to enroll the new recruits caused some disorder and produced great popular demonstrations against the new law. These demonstrations took place at a time when the workmen were engaged in their factories, and were entirely free from any element of roguery. The people who took part in them were drawn almost exclusively from among the better classes.

The crowds were eventually dispersed by the police and the Cossacks, who behaved with the greatest brutality and struck down old men and women and even children with their knouts. The semi-official account which appeared in the Finnish Gazette of the disorders at Helsingfors, and which was cabled to this country, is declared to be a gross exaggeration. There can be little doubt that it was intended to constitute a pretext and justification for measures of increased severity, in that that unfortunate nation.

The united opposition to the army regulations has been so far successful that the period for the enrollment of recruits has been prolonged to the end of June.

Aged Twins.
Christiana, Norway, is the home of a remarkable pair of twins, Hans Peter Lund and Anders Lund, who reached the advanced age of years on May 9. They are married to sisters, the daughters of the late Rev. P. Fris, of Sandfjord. Both couples are in excellent health and are well to do, and entertained in the liveliest manner the many friends who came from far and near to wish them "many happy returns of the day."

Wealth in Dunderland.
The Dunderland Iron Ore company is floating its shares in London. It will have a capital of \$5,000,000 kroner, and among the leading directors are Watson Armstrong, the gunmaker; Lord Kelvin and Thomas A. Edison, who has devised a plan for extracting the ore. In its prospectus the company announces that it will take out 750,000 tons annually.

The ore fields in Dunderland valley in Norway are said to be the most extensive in the world. It is estimated that there are 100,000,000 tons of ore in the fields which have not been so thoroughly prospected.

General Notes.
Premier Steen, who has retired after forty-two years of public life, was given a banquet recently by the Liberal club of Christiania. The old statesman made a long address in which he maintained that the best interests of Norway demanded that the present joint diplomatic and consular service be abolished.

The Good Templars have 400 lodges in Norway.

Mrs. Ebbe Augusta Bosstrom, a sister of former Minister Bosstrom, died May 10 in Upsala, aged 88. No woman in Sweden has accomplished more for the betterment of womanhood and for charitable institutions.

The University of Christiania and the scientific society will observe the one hundredth anniversary of the death of Mills Henrik Abel, the great mathematician, by a series of exercises Sept. 6. Over 250 invitations have been sent to universities, colleges and scientific societies to join in honoring the memory of one who is held to be one of the greatest of scientific geniuses in the world.

Sarpsborg, in the Little manufacturing town on Glommen river, had a bad fire on May 11. Sixteen buildings were destroyed, among them the government telephone and telegraph station. The loss will reach about 250,000 kroner.

The Swedish government has denied the second petition from Sweden for the pardon of twenty Swedes and four Norwegians among the shore prisoners on St. Helena.

Stephan Shindig, the famous Norwegian sculptor, has undertaken to design and model two of the group for the great monument to General William T. Sherman which is to be erected in Washington.

The sale of liquor on board the steamers plying on the Gotha river between Gothenburg and Trollhattan, has been prohibited by the local government, which has been sustained by the state.

The snow called to Gardemeen on May 1 found six inches of snow. Snow continued to fall for several days thereafter, but the results said that there was just as much fun shoveling snow as in drilling.

This they refused and Mr. Bros then decided to shut up shop. He expresses the belief that the men will come back on his terms after a short period of reflection.

Citizens of Rochester Make Ready—Date Is June 9.

The citizens of Rochester are planning to give the coming convention of the State Federation of Labor a hospitable welcome to their city. For Monday evening an address of welcome by the mayor, to which President Neary will respond, a musical program, and addresses by Thomas Spillane and Rev. D. W. Dornan will be given. Secretary McEwen of the Federation of Labor, and Labor Commissioner John O'Donnell.

Aid for Truckmen.
The general union of team drivers voted last night to pay \$100 out of the treasury to aid the striking truckmen in their strike. The truck drivers, previous to three months ago, were members of the Team Drivers' Union.

Sent Substitutes.
President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, did not put in an appearance at the Denver labor convention, which he expected offered to bring about a settlement between the warring labor factions.

Instead, he sent Thomas I. Kidd, third vice-president of the Federation, and Frank Morrison, its secretary, and they will speak for the settlement of their chief. Mr. Kidd is also president of the United Woodworkers of America and in that capacity has been a frequent visitor to Minneapolis at the instance of the local Woodworkers' Union.

A RURA, FREIGHT LINE

The Little Falls Electric Road Will Be Pushed.

General Manager W. B. Warren, of the Westinghouse Electric company, was in the twin cities yesterday making final arrangements for the transfer of the majority interest in the Little Falls Electric company, which he and allied interests now control. Definite plans for the new electric freight line to tap portions of Morrison county and adjacent sections will be completed within a week. This will be the first electric freight line in the west. A portion of the line is to be in operation before winter.

The territory through which the line will run is not served by any steam railway. The idea of the company is to build an electric railway of standard gauge, able to accommodate rolling stock of the steam roads. It is proposed to afford farmers in outlying districts shipping facilities by transferring freight cars and similar equipment from electric line points to steam roads at Little Falls.
