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APRIL DEATH RATE

Cities of Over 2,000 Suffer Heaviest Losses. According to the state board of health the April mortality rate for cities of over 2,000 inhabitants was four times as great as for the rest of Minnesota.

The total deaths for April were 1,232, and the average rate 9.46 per 1,000 for the year. Pneumonia caused 158 deaths, of which 45 were in Minneapolis.
