FOR AFTERNOON LUNCHEONS

New Feature in Connection With Glass Block Tea Room.

A "luncheon" room, which is to be devoted exclusively to small afternoon parties, has just been completed in connection with the Donaldson tea room on the fourth floor of the Glass Block.

The room is done in green and red, the green prevailing, and the harmonizing color effects are noticeable everywhere.

All the woodwork is done in weathered oak. The ceiling is with quarter sawed oak, and on the walls half way to the ceiling, weathered oak with red leather panels is used.

Beautiful swan lights with soft green globes are used in profusion. There are also two large electric chandeliers. The windows are of art glass tinted in green.

The upper portion of the walls are hand painted with just a suggestion of the oriental in the figures. A dark green, royal Wilton carpet covers the floor.

Between the beams the ceiling is carved with glazed aluminum, which gives a metallic effect. There is a roomy fireplace in one corner, and a great brass dragon, with jaws extended, sheds the light from the mantelpiece.

There are several little corner nooks with red-cushioned seats that look most inviting for tea-tetes.
