MAKING SULPHURIC ACID

Important Discovery Made by Chemist at the Sault.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., June 9.—An achievement that can be recorded as one of the triumphs of the twentieth century has just been made at the Sault Ste. Marie works of the Lake Superior Power company.

The process by which it is made is one of compression and expansion, an invention of E. S. Ross, chief metallurgist of the company, and he has been working on it ever since the reduction works were first built.





BISHOP HOYME DEAD

Prominent Norwegian Lutheran Dies at Eau Claire.

Eau Claire, Wis., June 9.—Bishop Gjermund Hoyme, president of the United Norwegian Lutheran Church of America, died at 8 o'clock this morning, after a lingering illness.

Bishop Gjermund Hoyme was born Oct. 8, 1848, in Valders, Norway. He came to America in 1861 with his parents, who settled at Port Washington, Wis.

His success since his arrival at Eau Claire forms a pleasant contrast to the picture of a young man who had just arrived in the city.
