TWO SHOTS WERE HEARD

TESTIMONY IN THE TANKE CASE
Tanke Reported to Have Said "I Have Killed One" Might Kill Another.

Henderson, Minn., June 13.—In the case of Frank Tanke, charged with the murder of John Wellner, the first witness for the state this morning was W. W. Willmott of Arlington.

In September, 1899, Willmott was still there. He (Tanke) and Mrs. Wellner, the witness said, were living together as husband and wife.

Fred Stolte, employed as baggage man at New Ulm for the Minneapolis & St. Louis, testified that he saw Tanke get off the train which arrives from Klossner station about 8:45 p. m. on New Year's eve, 1898.

On the night of Dec. 31, 1898, at about 8:15 o'clock he heard the rattle of a passenger train on the other side of Lafayette station, eight miles away.

FOUR DROWNED

Tornado Upsets Boat Near Dubuque—Two Stillwater Men Lost.

Dubuque, Iowa, June 13.—A tornado crossed the Mississippi river late yesterday afternoon at Maquoketa Chute, four miles north of here, and struck the raft steamer "Ravenna, overturning and sinking her, bottom side up.

The dead are Captain John Hoy, aged 52, Stillwater; Clerk Byron Trask, aged 42, Stillwater; Linesman Louis Walker, aged 19, Reed's Landing; Linesman Dell, aged 23, La Crosse.

Henry Spoerhase, bartender at the saloon of Charles Stenel, on Dec. 31, 1898, testified that the man who came into the saloon where he was employed on the Saturday evening on which Wellner is supposed to have met his death.
