ONE FARE TO THE FAIR

RAILROADS MAKE LIBERAL RATES

Program of the Races—Special Street Railway Service is Assured.

Railroad rates will be unusually favorable for the Minnesota state fair in September. It was decided at a meeting of the board of managers of the state agricultural association at the fair grounds yesterday that the roads would make a one-fare rate to the fair from all points within 200 miles of Minneapolis.

The Twin City Rapid Transit company will improve its service for the fair by putting on from thirty to forty new cars. The Northern Pacific road has also been asked to provide additional transportation facilities.

Special attention will be paid to sheep exhibits this year. An immense sheep barn, 145 by 144 feet in dimensions, is now under construction.

The proposed interurban driveway to the fair is also considered. The idea now is to boulevard Como avenue, St. Paul, to Snelling, Snelling to Langford, and Langford to Dayton at meeting of the grounds. From the fair grounds the boulevard would enter Minneapolis by way of University avenue.

AFTER FIFTY-SEVEN YEARS

Man Who Disappeared Long Ago Returns to Old Haunts.

Chicago, June 18.—Abraham Burns, aged 77 years, who disappeared from his home fifty-seven years ago and was thought to have been murdered in a trappers' feud, has returned to Hammond, Ind., "to visit the folks," he said.

The old man found his only surviving relative was a brother, Joseph Burns, two years his junior. It was not until the aged man had recalled confidence of the boyhood that either was satisfied of their relationship. Then they went into the house together and announced to all who called that they "guessed they'd live together hereafter."

Back in the '40s the Burns brothers were trappers in the Calumet lake region, and after a fight among a number of other trappers the older brother disappeared. He was supposed to have been killed and his body hidden. The parents died with this belief, as did several other members of the family. Abraham found his way out west and into the mountains of Idaho, where, according to his story, he lived as a hermit miner. Once he made his way by foot to San Francisco, but he soon returned to his mountain life. The old man had never ridden on a railway train until he commenced the journey home.
