THE ITALIAN BAND AT HARRIET

Two programs of rare excellence were rendered by Ellery's Italian band at Lake Harriet yesterday afternoon and evening, and were listened to in the afternoon by a more handful of people, but in the evening by an audience the size of which clearly indicated that the fame of the new band is being industriously spread by those who have heard it. Enthusiasm cannot be limited by numbers, however, and scarcely a number on either program which was not vigorously encored.

In the afternoon the "Zampa" overture was given an interpretation that was most finished and effective, better, indeed, than has been heard here before. That old favorite Strauss' "Blue Danube" waltz, won a hearty encore, although as customary, it was given in concert tempo. The Mendelssohn "Wedding March" was a great treat, but the finest feature of the afternoon was the performance of the "Mignon" overture, which was given with exquisite delicacy and finish.

The feature of the evening concert was the rendition for the first time in Minneapolis of Mascagni's "Hyacinths," a marvelous piece of descriptive writing, of surpassing merit and worth as a musical composition. Beginning with the utmost delicacy and in the simplest of themes, the melody developed through successive harmonic crescendos to a climax of superb strength. Mascagni was also represented on the program by the "Furioso" and "Cavalleria Rusticana," which earned as an encore the "Intermezzo" to the same composition. Perhaps nothing in the entire evening, however, evoked the applause accorded the "Grand Fantasia" from Bizet's "Carmen," which amounted to a perfect ovation.

Rivela has eminently demonstrated his qualifications as a director. He combines the enthusiasm and ardor of the conductor, his predecessor, with great poise and reserve force. His movements are dignified and graceful, and while admirably effective, detract nothing from the rendition of the band.

Signor Maresca is a wonder of technique and expression on the harp, but that beautiful instrument loses much of its effectiveness, due to the more delicate shades of expression in the hands of the band, which would add immensely to the enjoyment of the audience.
