

HAD A QUIET WEEK

Trade in Live Stock Interrupted by National Holiday. A GOOD DEMAND ALL AROUND Market for Hogs Ruled Higher and Receipts Showed a Gain Over Last Year.

South St. Paul, July 5.—This week has been broken into by a holiday and, as is usually the case when trade is interrupted for a day, receipts have been light and business quiet. Cattle receipts total about 1,000 head, against 2,000 head last week and 1,500 for the corresponding week a year ago. Cattle receipts show a loss. The total this week is less than 20 head against 100 last week and 150 a year ago.

Butcher cattle have been in excellent demand all the week with good quality, dry-fed stuff selling strong, while the common and grass cattle are just steady. There were no good butcher cattle on sale and to the best price on dry-fed steers has been \$6.50. The quality of these may be judged by the fact that buyers will pay \$7.50 and better for the right kind of cattle. Choice dry-fed cows and heifers are now quoted at \$5. A few scattering head received were good enough to bring \$6.25. Bulls are steady. Best veals are now selling at \$3.25. In the stocker and feeder division there has been very little change. Feeders of good quality have been in demand at all times and the demand has continued through this week. The better quality stockers by loads as they come in, but there was no improvement in prices.
