ADVENTURES ON THE MAINE

The Incident Which Led to His Hostility to Admiral Schley.

Chicago, July 15.—A Chronicle special from Washington says: Not since the Schley inquiry have naval circles been as stirred up as when a cable dispatch was received from Rear Admiral Crowninshield to the effect that he had run the battleship Illinois aground in Christiania harbor and that the vessel was so badly damaged that it would have to be put in dry dock.

Closely following upon Secretary Moody's trenchant criticisms of the policy of placing in command of large and important vessels men whose knowledge of matters nautical is confined to an office desk, the incident of the Illinois has caused much unfavorable comment upon the seamanship of certain officers of the navy in general and of Admiral Crowninshield in particular.

It was in 1897 that this court of inquiry was held. At that time Crowninshield, then a captain, was in command of the battleship Maine of the North Atlantic squadron. A squadron under command of Admiral Bruce was engaged in maneuvers of the harbor of Charleston, S. C., and the manner of the handling of the Maine raised much criticism.

This consisted of Admiral Schley, then a captain commanding the flagship New York, and two other officers. In investigating the conditions on Crowninshield's ship they found that there was no oil on board and the engines were being racked to pieces. They also found the crew almost on the verge of mutiny, owing to the dictatorial manners of the commander.

THE MURDER OF NATIVES

CHAFFEE ON THE WALLER CASE

Why the Findings of the Court-Martial Were Disapproved by the Commander.

Washington, July 15.—The incoming Philippine mail brings the full printed record of proceedings in the court-martial case of Major Lytleton W. T. Waller and Lieutenant John Horace Arthur Day of the marine corps, growing out of the killing of some native heavers in Samar.

The famous case of Major Lytleton W. T. Waller, of the marine corps, accused of murder in having ordered the execution of seven natives of Samar, is reviewed by General Chaffee, who says: In justice to the military service of the United States, common fairness to the hapless natives whom the accused sent to their deaths, and the need that this act, which partook more of unlawful retaliation than a justifiable act of war, shall not pass into an approved precedent to be followed by any anxious commander of a garrison.

So suspecting, it can be understood why, in their weakened mental and physical condition, the men, after their rescue, cried out for the punishment of the cargadores, to whose failure to obtain sufficient supplies of food they attributed all their suffering. Their officers, from their sick beds, voiced the revengeful anger of their men in a telephone message to the accused, then at Basey, advising him that the cargadores were killed.

In this instance there was no overwhelming necessity, no impending danger, no imperative interests, and, on the part of the accused, no overt acts to justify the summary course pursued. The accused was in telephonic communication with his brigade commander, but deliberately chose not to consult him regarding his contemplated action.
