The twenty-mile motor-paced cycle contest between Albert Champion of Paris, Bart de Guichard of France, Nat Butler of Boston and Tommy Hill of England, was the principal event on the program of the races which took place Saturday at New York. Champion won by a mile, with Butler second and Hill third. De Guichard, who it was expected, would give his countryman a hard race, finished last.

At the end of the first mile the men were racing in the following order: Champion, De Guichard, Butler and Hill. At the end of the seventh mile, Champion, Butler, De Guichard and Hill was the order, and at the sixteenth mile and up to the finish Champion still led, with Butler, Hill and De Guichard riding as named. The winner's time was 23:32 1/2.

At New York yesterday Lottie Brandon, paced by single motors, rode 31 1/2 miles in one hour. Lisette's old record for women was 29 miles and 15 1/2 yards.
