A SAG IN PRODUCE

Market Continues to Ease Off on Loading Lines.

STAPLES ARE ALL MUCH LOWER

Grocery List Also Shows Decline on Some Descriptions—Drug Trade Steady.

An easy and declining market has been experienced throughout the week on leading items of produce with values generally lower than were last Saturday. An absence of speculative interest on staples has contributed to this decline, but production is also heavy and it is being felt more and more as the season advances.

In butter and eggs the most pronounced sagging tendency has been apparent. Creamery and dairy extras have declined a full cent, while packing stock and seconds have eased off 2 1/2 cents.

Other commodities weaker. The storage season on eggs is practically ended, and the market is confined almost entirely to local consumption and call from outside points.

Fiscal year earnings for 1902 are exceptionally good, and it is probable that taken as a whole, the railway earnings for the half year will exceed 1901, despite reduced anthracite coal carriers' earnings.

New business in shoes at Boston is continuing to expand. Shipments of teapots are also showing a marked increase.


