This Leaves but Ames' Circle

THESE HAVE RESIGNED: Mayor A. A. Ames, Chief of Police Fred W. Ames, Captain 'Norm' King, under a penitentiary sentence, Captain otherwise 'Detective' Christopher Norbeck, in jail awaiting sentence, Captain Joseph Fitchette, under a workhouse sentence, Captain Charles R. Hill, Mayor's Secretary Thomas R. Brown, License Inspector Irwin A. Gardner, Special Officer Irwin A. Gardner, under a penitentiary sentence.

Because He Was Ames' Friend. License Inspector A. L. Gardner handed in his resignation to Fred M. Powers, acting mayor, at noon to-day, and it was promptly accepted.

Mr. Powers announced that, acting on Chief Getchel's advice, he would immediately detail Frank Hopper to act as license inspector until the return of Alderman D. P. Jones.

Mr. Powers was influenced in the determination to let matters take their own course for a few days by a telegram received this morning from Alderman Jones announcing definitely that he would be home Thursday.

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HEAD CUT OFF UNCLE SAM

WHO SHALL IT BE... PETERSON, HAY OR 'YOUR UNCLE LOREN'?

Three Candidates for Republican Nomination in the Fifth District Tell the Faith That Is in Them and Discuss Their Chances—Reasons for and Against Each One as a Candidate Against John Lind.

Why Each Thinks He Can Beat Lind. LOREN FLETCHER— I have no objections to running against Mr. Lind. He is a gentleman, an able man, and I have great respect for him, but I polled over 4,000 votes more in this district two years ago than he did for governor.

EUGENE G. HAY— I believe my position as the champion of Roosevelt's administration with regard to reciprocity with Cuba makes me 5,000 votes stronger than any other candidate. I have also declared in favor of reciprocity with Canada.

JAMES A. PETERSON— I think I am as well known in this county as either of my opponents, and that I know as many voters as any man in Hennepin county. I have done more public speaking than either Mr. Hay or Mr. Fletcher.

What will the republicans of Hennepin county do to beat John Lind? Who will be their candidate at the polls? There are three candidates before the people for the republican nomination.

On the other hand, Mr. Fletcher has some advantages which his supporters do not slow to proclaim. He has the money with which to keep things moving until election day.

There are three candidates before the people for the republican nomination. Loren Fletcher seeks a renomination, and is opposed by James A. Peterson and Eugene G. Hay.

There is no disposition on the part of republicans to belittle John Lind's strength in this county, and just now the second question is giving them more than the first.

None of three republican candidates shows a disposition to weaken. Each one claims to be the strongest candidate, in other words, the best republican.

Eugene G. Hay is considered the ablest speaker of the three. He has already conducted several successful discussions of the issues of the day.

Between now and Sept. 16 the republican voters of Hennepin county will weigh all these facts, put the 'pros' against the 'cons,' and make up their minds who is the best man of the trio to nominate against John Lind.
