The City of Venice, Ore Laden, Goes Down off Rondeau, Ont.

Three Men Drowned, Three Badly Hurt—Accident Due to Carelessness.

Cleveland, Aug. 5.—As a result of collision on Lake Erie between the steamer City of Venice, Ore-laden, and the steamer Seguin, a steel lumber vessel, off Rondeau, Canada, last midnight, the former vessel was sunk and three lives lost while several other persons were more or less seriously injured.
