

AN ATTACK ON KNOX

Millionaires Resent His Attitude on Trust.

BLOWS ARE STRUCK IN A CAFE

The Scene of the Fight Is an Aristocratic Hotel at Atlantic City.

Philadelphia, Aug. 8.—A local paper this morning prints the following special from Atlantic City, N. J.: Attorney General Knox was the victim of an attack here late last night in the cafe of a hotel.

The cause of the assault on Mr. Knox was his attitude against the trusts. His assailants were Charles T. Schoen, the multi-millionaire of Philadelphia and Pittsburgh; Theodore Cramp, the Philadelphia ship builder, and a Mr. Stevenson, also well known in Philadelphia.

The scene of the attack was a certain aristocratic hotel. The time 11:30 o'clock last night, in the cafe annex. In a little room adjoining the cafe was a table with eight places, all of which were occupied. The central figure at this table was Attorney General Knox. Seated with him were three other men and four women.

Mr. Knox and his party were well along with their repast when a carriage drove up to the hotel. Three men alighted, Charles T. Schoen and Theodore Cramp were two members of this party. The third was Mr. Stevenson. The three men made their way into the cafe annex and took seats at a small table.

Presently the head waiter leaned over the table at which Mr. Schoen, Mr. Cramp and Mr. Stevenson were seated. He requested them to moderate their voices. Thereupon the three men joined in an apology, and for the first time they took cognizance of the presence of Attorney General Knox and his party.

Later on came another quiet appeal from the waiter that they should not talk so loud. Again an apology was sent the party at. Attorney General Knox's table and for a few minutes the loud talk was suppressed.

A moment later a rather small man in evening dress leaned over the table where Mr. Schoen and his friends were seated. He requested that they refrain from further objectionable remarks. That man was Attorney General Knox. Just what was the reply he got from Mr. Schoen, Mr. Cramp and Mr. Stevenson, is somewhat uncertain.

Mr. Knox begged that the hostile three suppress their opinions until the women members of his party could retire from the scene. He and the other seven at once got up from their table and went out of the cafe annex.

Once in the street Mr. Knox excused himself and returned alone to the cafe annex. He strode over to the table occupied by Mr. Schoen, Mr. Cramp and Mr. Stevenson. In a moment all was confusion. Blows were launched widely. Just who struck the first blow cannot be said positively. But certain it is that while Mr. Knox was making a protest to Mr. Schoen against his language he was being called names that startled every one within hearing.

Then came a blow. It was struck by Mr. Cramp, and landed fairly on the belt of the attorney general. The blow staggered him back against the wall. At that moment half a dozen waiters rushed up. The head waiter seized Mr. Cramp from behind, pinning his arms. Another grappled with Mr. Stevenson and dragged him out of the struggle. Others took hold of Mr. Schoen.

Mr. Knox was speedily surrounded by his friends, and the party retired from the hotel and were driven away to their hotel.

This remarkable encounter, it is said, had its origin several days ago in the corridor of the Marlborough hotel. It came about through a little discussion concerning trusts.

THEY ARE CONFIDENT

Catholic Federation Believes the Government Will Do Better.

Chicago, Aug. 8.—The Catholic Federation yesterday voted to meet in Atlantic City in July, 1903. T. B. Mynahan, Columbus, Ohio, was chosen president. The following resolutions were adopted:

We hereby express confidence that the Honorable Theodore Roosevelt, president of the United States, will perform his duty under the constitution and laws, and our firm belief that he will institute a rigid judicial inquiry into any abuses by subordinate government officials in our territories, possessions and promptly rectify such abuses. We are especially confident that in his dealings with the serious problems arising in the Philippine islands, property and personal rights guaranteed by treaty, laws and constitution will be faithfully safeguarded and protected.

Resolved, That we extend to the friends in the Philippines our fullest sympathy in their hour of trial; that we appreciate the value of their services in the cause of religion and humanity; that we pledge them our support as American citizens in upholding the hands of our government in its determination to see that they are treated with that common justice that belongs to all who enjoy the protection of the American flag.

Resolved, That this federation congratulate the Vatican and the American government on the position attained in the negotiations regarding the questions which have arisen in the Philippines, and we express our full confidence that these negotiations will be continued until a just and amicable solution be obtained.
