IN A BUSINESS WAY A WOMAN INVENTOR

A New Needle Devised by Mrs. Eva J. Hall, of Minneapolis.

The little device, for the manufacture of which the Hall and Clark Needle Company was recently incorporated, with a million dollar capital, is the invention of a Minneapolis woman, Mrs. Eva Jennie Hall.

The contrivance is a self-threading sewing-machine needle, the first one of its kind ever invented.

The needle is made of a fine line of steel, which fits into the machine, is free end of a spring.

At present the device will be manufactured in the east. Later the company is expected to turn out its product in Minneapolis.

It will not be long before this little needle will be in general use in the nineteen foreign countries where it has been patented.
