The morning race, which was one dash for the Felker challenge cup, was the best of the regatta. The race was started in a very light wind. The first leg was a dead heat to windward. Challenge lost thirteen minutes in running the first two miles. Then on a spinnaker run to the next buoy she brought a good breeze down the line with her and picked up ten minutes. The last leg was a broad reach, and Challenge and Adelaide and Caroline rounded within half a minute. The wind continued strong and the second turning of the race was made in a breeze. The exciting finish was one of the closest and most exciting ever seen on the lake. It was a race all down the last stretch and sometimes one boat appeared to have the advantage, but the other would catch up. Adelaide succeeded in getting around fourteen seconds ahead of Challenge and Caroline crossed third seconds ahead of Caroline.
