"Nixies" are greatly reduced in number by the rural free delivery system. Out of 400 letters sent out recently by a local house to persons in Richfield and Bloomington townships, the name of the township being the only direction as to place given, only ninety were returned as "nixies," or non-deliverable for insufficient address...
